National Advantage, we will direct our Attention to the Support of our Linen Manufacture, to the Protection and Regulation of the Protestant Charter Schools, to the Security of the Church of Ireland, and to the Principles which Wifdom and Humanity fuggeft for the Advancement of Education and ufeful Knowledge.

We fincerely thank your Excellency for the particular Satisfaction which you express in our rifing Profperity, and for your Defire to co-operate with us in improving the Advantages we derive from the Bleffings of Peace : But, though fully fenfible of the Value of those Bleffings, we are no lefs intimately concerned in the Honor of His Majefty's Crown and the general Interest of the Empire; and your Excellency may reft perfuaded, that had His Majefty judged it neceffary to call forth our Exertions for the Defence of those Objects, He would have found as cordial and as zealous a Support from this Kingdom as from any other Part of His Majesty's Dominions.

On reviewing these important Events, we acknowledge and admire the superior Wisdom of His Majesty's Counsels, which, without interrupting the Peace of His Dominions, have fo honorably augmented the Luftre of His Crown, and promoted the true Interests of His Empire.

We shall not helitate to make the necessary Provisions for the Public Service, through a well-founded Confidence; that what we grant with Chearfulness will be expended with Integrity.

We return your Excellency our fincere Acknow-ledgments for the Intereft you are pleafed to express for our Welfare and Prosperity. We rec. affured, that convinced of our inviolable Loyalty and Attachment to our Sovereign, you. will reprefent our Conduct with Fidelity, whilft you promote with Earneft-nefs His Majefty's paternal Withes for the Happinels of Ireland.

We are fenfible of your Excellency's Wildom in recommending to our particular Care that great Staple of our Commerce, the Linen Manufacture, as well' as the Protection and Regulation of the Protestant Charter Schools, the Security of the National Church, and those Principles of Education and uteful Knowledge, which have been already fuggested for improving the Morals of the People. Our Attention will be immediately directed to those great Otjects which your Excellency has felected with fucr. judicious Knowledge of our real Situation and true Incereffs.

We cannot be iufficiently grateful for the Satisfaction your Excellency has expressed at the Increase of our Credit and Prosperity, and the Extension of our Commerce and Manufactures, whilft we are convinced of your Anxiety to improve the Advantages which may be derived to them from feduloufly cultivating the Bieffings of Peace.

We mult, however, request your Excellency to affure His Majefty, that no Part of His Empire would have difplayed more Alacrity and Zeal for His Service, if He had judged it neceffary to call forth the Spirit and Refources of His People, in Defence of the Honor of His Crown, or the general and common Interefts of the Empire.

His Excellency's Answer.

I Return you my best Thanks for this Address so frongly expressive of your Partiality to me; and I trust that by Perseverance in the same Conduct, which was formerly marked by the honorable Testimony of your Ap-probation and Regards, I shall not be unworthy of the Confidence which you have to kindly reposed in my Zeal for the King's Service, and in my Affection for this Kingdom.
