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## From $\mathbb{T}$ gutgoay April 25.

 Cadiz, April 3.YEfferday arrived here Captaill Herbert in the Rupert, Sir Reger Strickland in the Mary, and the Pbenix, in 15 dayes from Portfmonth, having with them a Prize, being a new Ship; hever before at Sea, and one of the belt the Algierins have, mounted with 40 Guns, (but can carry 54 ) and 500 men; with whom the Rupert and Mary met the firft inftant, (the Pbenix being fent the day before to look after the Alexander, (aptain Farris, who was feparated from them, but is likewife arrived here with the faid Frigats) and gave Chace to her. The Rupert bcing the beft Sailer came up firlt, and had a $\nabla^{\circ} \mathrm{ry}$ Gharp Engagemeat with the Algierin, who made a defperate defence; but when Sir Reger Strickland carae up likewife, the $A^{\prime}$ gierin furrendrud, having lolt $200 \mathrm{M}^{\wedge} \mathrm{n}$; and among thofe that remained alive, were found about 45 Chriftian Slaves. The Captain of the $A l-$ gierin is an old Turk, who, when he could defend his Ship no longer, caufed all the Arms to be thrown over Board. On foard the Frigats fev ral Men have been killed and wounded, efpecially by the Turks fimall fhot, which they poured very thick into the Frigats. In the Rupert all the Officers, to the Boativaius Mate, with ry orbers are killed, and between 30 and 40 wounded, and eaptain Hexbert himelf is very muchBurnt in the face by fom: Powder in Bandetiers, which took Fire on the Quartef-deck, but without danger, though as tethe hath not recovered his fight. About five daycs fince, by a Saitea come ont of the Streights, we had Advice, that Sir fobn Narborough had met five digidrin Men of War, tita he had funk three of them, and taken one, and that the ${ }^{\text {th }}$ oftaped; which we foould be glad to hear confirmed.
Tangier, April 8. From Cadiz we have an account, that Captain Herbert in the Rupert, and Sir Roger Strickland in the Mary, h ive taken the third beft thip of Algiers, having 40 Guns mounted, (but could carry many nore) and 500 Men ; the Rupert had a long and fharp Englgement with him, before the Mary could cone up, the Turks fighting molt defperately; infomach that of the 500 , liear 200 were flain, whith could not be without lofs likewife on the fide of the Englifh; the greateft was in the Rupert, who 16ft all her Officers except the Captain (who is likewife burnt in the Face, by a flulh of Powder that took Fire. ) Some Men were likewife killed and wounded in the Mary, who, they fay, laid the Algier in on Board, and fo took her, the Turks being refolved to fight it out to the laft.
Madrid, April 20. On the 11 inftant, being Eafter Monday, the Duke of Medina Sidonia was married, at wihich Ceremony affifted all the Nobility and Perfons of the Court.On the 13, the Kirg removed to Aranjuez, feven Leagues diftant from hence, defigning, ac cording to the ufual Cultom at this Sealon of the year, to fpend there about a month or five weeks, to divert himfelf with the Recreations that place af-

On the $r^{\prime} 4$, the confirmation of the French forlaking ATe/fina, Auguffa, and their other holds in \$iclly; and the re-eftablifhment of the Spanifh Authofity there, was brought by a Perfon, Exprefs; upon Whigh his Majelty, in imitation of his Father, Pbilip the Fourth, (Who was wont to give thanks for the pinre eminent Succeffes of his Government, in the Church of Atocba, near this Town) returped hither on the 15, in ord r to th: like Solemnity. That evening and next morning was taken up in receiving the congratulations which the A mbaffadots, Grandees and Councils performed to his Majelty on this occafron ; and in the afternoon of the 16 , his Majefty wen on Horfcback to Atocha, through the principal itreets of this Town, in this Order: Firf marched 9 Trumpets, and 2 Kettle drums, followed by the conde do los Arcos, with the Spanifh Guard of Halberdiers, whereof he is Captain; then went two Alcades de Corte, after whom the Gentiles bombres de boca, andother Ufficers of the Houlhold; then the three S-cretaries of State, Don Pedro Coloma, Don Bartbolome Legaffa, and Don Geronimo de Eguia; next the Counfetlors of Stare, Grandees, and chief Officers of the Palac: ; then Don $\mathcal{F}$ uan of Auftia, at a litele diftance before the King towards his lfit hand ${ }^{2}$ and immediately after the King; the Nuncio, and Fenetian: Ambaffador, followed by the Gentlemen of his Majesties wedchamber, and other Noblemen who aret net Grandees, all on Horfeback; the Nuncio only rode on a Mule, as the cuftom is here for Ecclefiaftical Petfons in publick Solemniti -s of this kind: near the Kings right firrup, went the Conde de Tatara, firlt Gentleman of the Horce on foot, and on both fidesall his Ma efties Cavallerio's and Pages. The whule Cavalcade was clofed by 7 or 8 of the King's and Don fuan S Coaches, and about 16 led Horles. 7 Te Deum being fung in our Ladues Chappel of Atocba, the whole Company returned to the Palace in the fame order; and for the three fucceeding nights, the People fet out Luminaries, and madeBonfires through the itreets. On the 17 , the King recurned to AranJHez:
Vienma, April 17. This day Te Deum hath been fung int our Cathedral Church, and all the Cannon dilcharged, with other publick demonfrations of Joy, on occafion of the French having quiteed Sicily. the 15 inflant General Cobs, who is come from furgary, attended the Emperor, and gave him a large account of the prefent pofture of things in that Countrey. The fame day the Eavoy of the Elector of Bat viria had Audi nce of his Imperial Majelty. People here will fay, That there is a Narriage deligned between that Electoral Prince, and the Archdutchefs. Mariana, the Emperors Silter; and another between the Electors daughter, and the Priuce of Neuburgh: but what ground they have for it, we as yet know not It is likewife faid, That certain Deputies are to come hither from the Malecontents of Etaugary ${ }^{2}$ and that the Emperor is refolved to grant them a genoral Pardon, with reltitution of their Goods and Eftates.

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
