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From Thursday April 25. to World

Cadiz, April 3. Esferday arrived here Captain Herbert in the Rupert, Sir Roger Strickland in the Mary, and the Phenix, in 15 dayes from Portfinouth, having with them a Prize, being a new Ship, hever before at Sea, and one of the best the Algierins have, mounted with 40 Gins, (but can carry 54) and 500 men; with whom the Rupert and Mary met the first instant, (the Phenix being sent the day before to look after the Alexander, Captain Harris, who was separated from them, but is likewise arrived here with the said Fri-gats) and gave Chace to her. The Rupers being the best Sailer came up first, and had a vary sharp Engagement with the Algierin, who made a desperate defence; but when Sir Roger Strickland came up likewise, the A'gierin surrendred, having lost 200 Man; and among those that remained alive, were found about 45 Christian Slaves. The Captain of the Algierin is an old Turk, who, when he could defend his Ship no longer, caused all the Arms to be thrown over Board. On Board the Frigats feveral Menhave been killed and wounded, especially by the Turks small thot, which they poured very thick into the Frigats. In the Rupert all the Officers, to the Boatswains Mate. with 19 others, are killed, and between 30 and 40 wounded, and Captain Herbert himself is very much burnt in the Face by fom? Powder in Bandehers, which took Fire on the Quarter-deck, but without danger, though as weathe hath not recovered his fight. About five dayes fince, by a Saitea come out of the Streights, we had Advice, that Sir John Narborough had met five Algierin Men of War, that he had funk three of them, and taken one, and that the 7th ofca-ped; which we should be glad to hear confir-

Tangier, April 8. From Cadiz we have an account, that Captain Herbert in the Rupert, and Sir Roger Strickland in the Mary, have taken the third best thip of Algiers, having 40 Guns mounted, (but could carry many more) and 500 Men; the Rupert had a long and sharp Engagement with him, before the Mary could come up, the Turks sighting most desperately, insomuch that of the 500, near 200 were slain, which could not be without loss likewise on the side of the English; the greatest was in the Rupert, who loss all her Officers except the Captain (who is likewise burnt in the Face, by a slash of Powder that took Fire.) Some Men. were likewise killed and wounded in the Mary, who, they say, laid the Algierin on Board, and so took her, the Turks being resolved to sight it out to the last.

Madrid, April 20. On the 11 instant, being Easter Monday, the Duke of Medina Sidonia was married, at which Ceremony assisted all the Nobility and Persons of the Court. On the 13, the King removed to Aranjuez, seven Leagues distant from hence, designing, according to the usual Custom at this Season of the year, to spend there about a month or sive weeks, to divert himself with the Recreations that place af

fords. On the r4, the confirmation of the French for aking Messina, Augusta, and their other holds in Sicily; and the re-establishment of the Spanish Authotity there, was brought by a Person, Express; upon which his Majelty, in imitation of his Father, Philip the Fourth, (who was wont to give thanks for the more eminent Successes of his Government, in the Church of Arocha, near this Town) returned hither on the 15, in order to the like Solemnity. That evening and next morning was taken up in receiving the congratulations which the Ambassadots, Grandees and Councils performed to his Majesty on this occafion; and in the afternoon of the 16, his Majesty went on Horseback to Atocha, through the principal streets of this Town, in this Order: First marched 9 Trumpets, and 2 Kettle drums, followed by the Conde de los Arcos, with the Spanish Guard of Halberdiers, whereof he is Captain; then went two Alcades de Corte, after whom the Gentiles hombres de bosa, and other Officers of the Houthold; then the three Secretaries of State, Don Pedro Coloma, Don Bartholome Legassa, and Don Geronimo de Eguia; next the Counsellors of Stare, Grandees, and chief Officers of the Palace; then Don Fuan of Austria, at a little diffance before the King towards his 1 ft hand, and immediately after the King; the Nuncio, and Fenetian Ambassador, followed by the Gentlemen of his Majesties accichamber, and other Noblemen who are not Grandees, all on Horseback; the Nuncio only role on a Mule, as the custom is here for Ecclesiastical Perfons in publick Solemniti s of this kind: near the King's right stirrup, went the Conde de Tatara, first Gentleman of the Horse on foot, and on both sides all his Ma esties Cavallerio's and Pages. The whole Cavalcade was closed by 7 or 8 of the King's and Don Juan's Coaches, and about 16 led Horles. Te Deum being fung in our Ladies Chappel of Atocha, the whole Company returned to the Palace in the fame order; and for the three succeeding nights, the People fet out Luminaries, and madeBonfires through the streets. On the 17, the King returned to Aran-

Vienna, April 17. This day Te Deum hath been fung in our Cathedral Church, and all the Cannon discharged, with other publick demonstrations of Joy, on occasion of the French having quitted Sicily. the 15 instant General Cobs, who is come from Hungary, attended the Emperor, and gave him a large account of the present posture of things in that Coun-The fame day the Envoy of the Elector of Bavaria had Audinnee of his Imperial Majesty. People here will fay, That there is a Marriage defigned between that Electoral Prince, and the Archdutcheis Mariana, the Emperors Sifter; and another between the Electors daughter, and the Prince of Neuburgh : but what ground they have for it, we as yet know not. It is likewise said, That certain Deputies are to come hither from the Malecontents of Hungary! and that the Emperor is refolved to grant them a genoral Pardon, with restitution of their Goods and Estates.
