Vienna, Dec.: o. Upon the Complaints which have been made from the Grand Seignier of the incursions of the Hungarians particularly of Count Ealassi Imbre and his Hussars, his Imperial Majefly has fummoned the faid Count to Vienna, and committed him under a Guard of 24 Mu quetiers, till he shall acquit himself of the charge land against him. Since we have recoived advise, that Count Lifley is upon his return, and intends to be upon the borders at the end of this moneth, all the Imperial Ministers are preparing to entertain him in their feveral turns, every one having a particular order to present him with some kind of curiosity. The Turkish Ambassador is resolved to meet ours on the borders, and is expected to take his leave fuddenly. The Council of War have refelred to defor the fresh Levies until the next Spring; but in the mean time the rectuits goen. Since a flop is jut to the incursions of the Hungarians, the Trade begins to go on again.
