Westminster, July 11.

THIS Day His Majesty came to the House of Peers, and being in His Royal Robes, seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, Sir Francis Molyneux, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Assent to

An Act to regulate, for a limited Time, the shipping and carrying Slaves, in British Vessels, from the Coast of Africa.

After which His Majesty was pleased to make the following most Gracious Speech:

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

IN the present advanced Season of the Year, and after the laborious Attendance which the Public Business has required of you, I think it necessary to put an End to the present Session of Parliament. I cannot do this without expressing the Satisfaction with which I have observed the uniform and diligent Attention to the Welfare of My People, which has appeared in all your Proceedings.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

The Cheerfulness and Liberality with which you have granted the necessary Supplies, demand My particular Acknowledgments. It must afford you the greatest Satisfaction that you have been enabled, without any Addition to the Burthens of My People, to provide for the Extraordinary Exigencies of the last Year, in Addition to the current Demands of the Public Service, and to the Sum annually appropriated to the Reduction of the National Debt.

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

I see with Concern the Continuance of the War between Russia and the Porte, in which the Emperor has also taken a Part. But the general State of Europe, and the Assurances which I receive from Foreign Powers, afford me every Reason to expect that My Subjects will continue to enjoy the Blessings of Peace.

The Engagements which I have recently entered into with My good Brother the King of Prussia, and those with the States General of the United Provinces, which have already been communicated to you, are directed to this Object, which I have uniformly in View, and they will, I trust, be productive of the happiest Consequences, in promoting the Security and Welfare of My own Dominions, and in contributing to the general Tranquillity of Europe.

Then the Lord Chancellor, by His Majesty's Command, said;

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

IT is His Majesty's Royal Will and Pleasure, that this Parliament be prorogued to Thursday the Twenty-fifth Day of September next, to be then here holden; and this Parliament is accordingly prorogued to Thursday the Twenty-fifth Day of September next.

The King has been pleased to constitute and appoint the Right Honourable John Earl of Chatham, Richard Hopkins, Esq; the Honourable John Jefferies Pratt (commonly called Lord Viscount Bayham;) John Leveson Gower, Esq; Rear Admiral of the Blue; the Honourable Henry Bathurst (commonly called Lord Apsley;) the Right Honourable Charles George Lord Arden, of the Kingdom of Ireland; and the Right Honourable Samuel Lord Hood, of the same Kingdom, Vice Admiral of the Blue, to be His Majesty's Commissioners for executing the Office of High Admiral of the Kingdoms of Great Britain and Ireland.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,
The humble Address of the Agents for the American Loyalists.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

YOUR Majesty's ever dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Agents for the American Loyalists, who have heretofore been the Suppliants of your Majesty on Behalf of their distressed Constituents, now humbly beg Leave to approach your Throne, to pour forth the ardent Effusions of their grateful Hearts for your most gracious and effectual Recommendation of their Claims to the just and generous Consideration of Parliament.

To have devoted their Fortunes, and hazarded their Lives in Defence of the just Rights of the Crown, and the fundamental Principles of the British Constitution, were no more than their Duty demanded of them, in common with your Majesty's other Subjects; but it was their peculiar Fortune to be called to the Trial; and it is their Boast and their Glory to have been found equal to the Task. They have now the distinguished Happiness of seeing their Fidelity approved by their Sovereign, and recompensed by Parliament; their Fellow Subjects cheerfully contributing to compensate them for the Persecutions their Attachment to Great Britain incited them to incur; thereby adding Dignity to their own exalted Character among the Nations of the World, and holding out to Mankind the glorious Principles of Justice, Equity, and Benevolence, as the firmest Basis of Empire.

We should be wanting in Justice and Gratitude, if we did not, upon this Occasion, acknowledge the Wisdom and Liberality of the Provisions proposed by your Majesty's Servants, conformable to your Majesty's gracious Intentions, for the Relief and Accommodation

dation of the several Classes of Sufferers to whose Cases they apply; and we are convinced it will give Comfort to your Royal Breast to be assured they have been received with the most general Satisfaction.

Professions of the unalterable Attachment of the Loyalists to your Majesty's Person and Government we conceive to be unnecessary; they have preserved it under Persecution, and Gratitude cannot render it less permanent. They do not presume to arrogate to themselves a more fervent Loyalty than their Fellow-Subjects possess; but, distinguished as they have been by their Sufferings, they deem themselves entitled to the foremost Rank among the most zealous Supporters of the Constitution. And while they cease not to offer up their most earnest Prayers to the Divine Being to preserve your Majesty, and your Illustrious Family, in the peaceful Enjoyment of your just Rights, and in the Exercise of your Royal Virtues in promoting the Happiness of your People, they humbly beseech your Majesty to continue to believe them, at all Times, and upon all Occasions, equally ready, as they have been, to devote their Lives and Properties to your Majesty's Service, and the Preservation of the British Constitution.

A Royal Edict has been lately published here, granting the Liberty of importing Grain into any Part of the Danish Dominions.

Hague, July 4.

Yesterday Morning the States General, in a Body, waited on his Serene Highness the Prince of Orange at the House in the Wood, to communicate to him the Act of Guaranty, which the Confederate States have mutually entered into, for the Maintenance of the Stadtholderian Form of Government in each of the Provinces respectively. On this Occasion Monf. Heckeren de Zuderas, First Deputy of Guelderland, made a complimentary Speech to his Serene Highness. The following is a Translation of the Act of Guaranty:

THE Lords the States of the Provinces of Guelderland, Holland and West Friesland, Zeland, Utrecht, Friesland, Overijssel and Groningen, and of the County of Drenthe, having reflected upon the Causes of the intestine Divisions by which the Republic, and each Province in particular, have of late Years been distracted; and having found that these Divisions have, for the greatest Part, arisen from the false and dangerous Idea entertained by certain Persons, whether real or pretended, respecting the Constitution and Form of Government of these Provinces, and especially with regard to the Importance and Necessity of the high and hereditary Dignities of Stadtholder, Captain and Admiral General, which Idea they had instilled into the Minds of other Inhabitants not so well informed; and having, moreover, considered, that at the Time of the happy Restoration and Confirmation of the Hereditary Stadtholdership in 1747 and 1748, the Confederates regarded the Union of all those Dignities in the Person of one Prince only, both with respect to the several Provinces, and to the Countries of the Generality, as a singular Advantage to the Republic, being convinced that the Bond of the Union would derive from it renewed Vigour and Solidity: That consequently these Dignities having, from that Period, obtained a closer and more intimate Connection with the whole Confederacy, they ought not only to be considered as an essential Part of the Constitution and Form of Government of each Province, but likewise of the Republic at large, and so attached to the Union, that it cannot possibly subsist and prosper without these Dignities; and that therefore, as the Confederates are bound to assist each other, at the Risk of their Lives and Fortunes, for the Preservation of the Bond of Union, it necessarily follows, that they are under a mutual Obligation to support each other, in respect to the first and principal Means by which the Union may be preserved and maintained, and to protect it with their united Force against all Enterprizes; the more so as Experience has shewn during the late Troubles, that from Beginnings of slight Importance, which appeared at first to have only trifling Altera-

and

tions in View, a general Confusion ensued, which brought the Confederacy to the Eve of its Dissolution: The Deputies of the above-mentioned Provinces do solemnly declare, in the Name and by Order of the Lords the States of their respective Provinces; by the present Act, that the said Lords the States regard and consider the Dignities of Stadtholder, Captain and Admiral-General, with all the Pre-eminences and Prerogatives thereunto annexed, in the Manner and upon the same Footing as they were conferred, in the several Provinces, and possessed by the present Prince Stadtholder, in the Year 1766, as an essential Part of their Constitution and Form of Government, and they mutually guaranty the same to each other, as a fundamental Law of the State, promising that they will not suffer this fundamental Law, so absolutely necessary for the Repose and Safety of the Republick, to be deviated from in either of the Provinces of the Confederacy.

In Testimony whereof, we the Underwritten, being, by virtue of the Resolutions of their High Mightinesses of this Day, expressly authorized thereto, have each of us, in the Name of our respective States, and in Conformity to their respective Resolutions, signed this Instrument. Office for Auditing the Public Accounts,
Somerset Place, July 12, 1788.

WHEREAS divers Persons, to whom Money has been issued for Public Services, have neglected to deliver into this Office the Vouchers for the Expenditure thereof, together with an Account Current, in the Manner, and within the Time prescribed by the Act for better examining and Auditing the Public Accounts of this Kingdom, the Commissioners for Auditing the Public Accounts have directed that Copies of the following Sections of the said Act be inserted in the London Gazette, in order that all Persons to whom Public Money has been, or shall be, so issued, may be informed of the Consequences of such Neglect.

SECTION XVII. And whereas great Losses and Inconveniences have arisen to the Public, by Sub-Accountants not having been put in Charge till a long Time has elapsed after the Monies were issued to them, be it enacted, That the Paymaster-General of His Majesty's Forces, the Treasurer of the Navy, the Treasurer of the Ordnance, and every other Public Officer who shall hereafter pay into the Hands of any Person or Persons whomsoever, Money for Public Services, by Way of Imprest or on Account, shall, within Thirty Days of the 31st Day of December, One thousand seven hundred and eighty-five, and within Thirty Days of the 31st Day of December in every future Year, transmit an Account of all Sums of Money issued or paid by him or them to any Person or Persons, for the Public Service, within the preceding Year, to the Commissioners to be appointed under the Authority of this Act; who shall, and they are

hereby required forthwith to transmit Duplicates of the same to His Majesty's Remembrancer in the Court of Exchequer, who shall immediately, on Receipt of such Accounts, put the several Sums so issued in Charge against the Parties, in like Manner as now practised with respect to Persons who receive Money by Way of Imprest, and on Account; at the Receipt of His Majesty's Exchequer.

SECTION XVIII. Provided always, and be it enacted, That no Accountant shall be allowed in his Account any Sum which he shall issue or pay over to any Sub-Accountants, unless he shall have transmitted to the said Commissioners regular Accounts thereof, in the Manner and within the Times abovementioned; unless Proof shall be produced, to the Satisfaction of the Lord High Treasurer, or the Commissioners of the Treasury, that any Failure of transmitting the same did not happen from the wilful Neglect of the Person issuing or paying over the Money as aforesaid.

SECTION XX. And be it further enacted and declared, That every Sub-Accountant to whom Money shall hereafter be issued for Public Service, in case the Money so issued shall have been for Services to be performed in Great Britain, shall deliver into the Office of the Commissioners to be appointed by virtue of this Act, the Vouchers for the Expenditure thereof, together with an Account Current, within Three Months of the End of each Year from the Commencement of his Account, unless it has been usual for such Account to be made up to any fixed Period in the Year; in which Case they shall be delivered within Three Months of the usual annual Time of the Determination of each Account respectively; and in case such Monies shall have been issued for Services to be performed in any Part of Europe out of this Kingdom, then the Vouchers shall be delivered within Four Months of the Expiration of each Year's Accounts; if in the West Indies, the Continent of America, or in Africa, within Six Months after the Expiration of each Year's Accounts; and if in the East Indies, within Twelve Months after the Expiration of each Year's Accounts; unless it shall in each and every Case be made appear to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of the Treasury, that the Failure of transmitting the same, within the Periods beforementioned, was unavoidable; in which Case such further Delay may be granted by Warrant under the Hands of the Commissioners of the Treasury, or any Three of them, as they shall judge reasonable; and in such Cases the Vouchers shall be delivered at the Expiration of the Term of Delay so granted, on Pain, upon Failure in any of the abovementioned Cases, of paying such Fine to His Majesty as the Court of Exchequer, on Application made to them, shall think fit to set and impose; which Fine the said Court is hereby authorized and empowered to set and impose accordingly.

SECTION XXII. Provided always, and be it enacted, that when any Sub-Accountant or Sub-Accountants shall transmit to the Commissioners, to be appointed under the Authority of this Act, a sufficient and satisfactory Discharge from the Principal Officers of the Ordnance, the Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy, the Commissioners for Victualling His Majesty's Navy, or the Commissioners for Sick and Hurt, for any Monies he or they shall have received in the said Departments severally, the said Commissioners shall transmit a Duplicate of the same to His Majesty's Remembrancer in the Court of Exchequer, who shall forthwith strike out the Name or Names of such Sub-Accountant or Sub-Accountants from the Imprest Roll; and such Sub-Accountant or Sub-Accountants shall from thenceforth be discharged from any other or further Account for the same.

Exchequer Bill-Office, July 11, 1788.

THE Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury have given Directions for paying off Exchequer Bills issued pursuant to an Act of Parliament passed in the Twenty-seventh Year of His present Majesty's Reign, for raising a further Sum of Money by Loans or Exchequer Bills, for the Service of the Year 1787, and charged on the Aids of the present Year, and that the Principal and Interest on such Bills shall be paid at the Exchequer Bill Office in St. Margaret's-street, between the two Palace-Yards, Westminster, on Tuesday the 29th of this instant July; and Attendance will be given on that and the succeeding Days, from Ten o'Clock in the Morning 'till One in the Afternoon (Sundays and Holydays excepted) for that Purpose: And for the greater Dispatch, the Bearers of the said Bills are desired to bring Lists thereof, containing the Numbers, Times of Commencement of Interest, with the Principal Sums and Interest due on such Bills, to be computed at Two Pence Halfpenny by the Day on every Hundred Pounds, from the Time of Commencement to the said 29th Day of July; on which Day the Interest on the said Exchequer Bills will cease: And they are desired to write their Names and Places of Abode on such Lists, and endorse their Names on the Back of the said Bills: And such Persons as are desirous of having new Exchequer-Bills of the present Year in Part of Payment, upon mentioning the same at the Foot of their Lists delivered on or before Saturday the 26th Instant, will be accommodated with new Bills of 100l. each, carrying an Interest of Two-pence Halfpenny a Day to the Amount of the Principal of the Bills by them delivered up; which new Bills will bear Date the said 29th of July, and will be delivered on the 2d of August next, and on the following Days, at the said Office.
