The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HIS Majesty in Council was this Day pleased to order, That the Parliament which stands prorogued to Thursday the 25th Day of this instant September, should be further prorogued to Thursday the 20th Day of November next.

Whitehall, September 19.

Last Night one of His Majesty's Messengers arrived at the Office of the Marquis of Carmarthen, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, with the King of Prussia's Ratification of the Treaty of Defensive Alliance, signed at Berlin on the 13th of August last, which was exchanged at Berlin on the 11th Instant, with Joseph Ewart, Esq; His Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary to that Court, against His Majesty's Ratification, by His Prussian Majesty's Plenipotentiary.

Whitehall, September 20.

The King has been pleased to grant to Charles Medows, of Thoresby Park, in the County of Nottingham, Esq; (Second Son of Philip Medows, late of Brook-street, in the Parish of St. George, Hanover-square, in the County of Middlesex, Esq; deceased, by the Right Honourable Lady Frances his Wife, Sister of His Grace Evelyn Pierrepont, late Duke of Kingston, deceased) and His Issue, his Royal Licence and Authority to take the Surname and bear the Arms of Pierrepont only, in pursuance of the last Will of the said Duke of Kingston; such Arms being first duly exemplified according to the Laws of Arms, and recorded in the Heralds Office.

The King has also been pleased to grant to Robert Bateson, of Mortimer-street, Cavendish-square, in the County of Middlesex, Esq; and his Issue, His Royal Licence and Authority to assume the Name of Harvey in Addition to that of Bateson, and also to bear the Arms of Harvey quartered with those of Bateson, in Compliance with the last Request of his late Uncle, David Harvey, late of Upper Charlotte-

street in the said County of Middlesex, Esq; deceased; such Arms being first duly exemplified according to the Laws of Arms, and recorded in the Heralds Office:

And also to order that these His Majesty's several Concessions and Declarations be registered in His College of Arms.

Stockholm, September 2.

His Swedish Majesty returned here Yesterday Morning in perfect Health from Finland, leaving the Command of the Swedish Army, which had retired within the Frontiers, to the Duke of Ostrogothia. The Fleet is still lying in the Harbour of Sweaborg.

Vienna, September 6.

By Advices from the Corps under the Command of General Wartenleben we learn, that, on the 28th of August, the Turks, to the Number of Six or Seven Thousand Men, which was gradually augmented to 18,000, returned to the Attack of the Palanka of Berfa, and, after an obstinate Resistance on the Part of the Imperialists, made themselves Masters of it, though with a very considerable Loss of Men: On the same Day the Turks transported heavy Cannon to the Summit of a Hill (which had been judged entirely impracticable) from whence they had the Command of the Austrian Camp. These Circumstances, added to the Delay of the Succour expected from the Emperor, determined General Wartenleben to quit that Position, and to retreat towards Caransebes, which he effected on the 29th with no great Loss, though his Rear Guard was repeatedly attacked by the Turks. On the 30th his Encampment extended from the Village of Fenisch to Terragova, across the high Road which leads to Caransebes. The Town of Meadia, with the Bourgs of Cornia and Tokl, have fallen into the Hands of the Turks, together with some small Magazines of Provision and Ammunition which had been collected there.

Letters from the Emperor's Army, of the 30th of August, mention, that His Imperial Majesty had advanced as far as Caransebes, and that it was expected his Head Quarters, on the 31st, would be at Statina, within Twenty-four Hours March of General Wartenleben's Camp.

Intelligence is received from Croatia of the Surrender of Dubitzta to the Imperialists, under the Command of Marshal Laudohn, on the 26th of August. The Garrison, consisting of 366 Turkish Soldiers, were made Prisoners of War. On the 29th the Marshal, with a numerous Army, marched to the Attack of Novi.

The Grand Vizir has passed the Danube at Cladowa, and a Body of Turks, amounting to Four or Five Thousand, commanded by a Pacha, has been detached from Porfcheny to Schuppaneck.

" Directly Directly or no Gx G"

" Turn him out Turn him out as no Blood mite not Be shed for the Sins Lieths at Your one Door

" Gx G"

" A^d 10th" " My name is Plain Truth."

" To Mr. Garnier Esq;

" Wickham

" Hants"

And that a few Days after the said incendiary Letter was found as above mentioned, viz. on the 29th Day of August, a Gun or Blunderbuss was fired off in the Middle of the Night nearly under the Bed-Chamber of the said George Garnier, Esq; whereby Two Panes of Glass in the Window of the Room immediately under the said Bed-Chamber were broken.

His Majesty, for the better apprehending and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in writing and laying the incendiary Letter above mentioned at the Door of the said George Garnier; and in firing off the Gun or Blunderbuss as aforesaid, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them (except the Person who actually wrote the said Letter, or fired off the said Gun or Blunderbuss,) who shall discover his or her Accomplice or Accomplices in either of the said Offences, so that he, she or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
