Dublin Castle, September 23, 1788.

Yesterday being the Anniversary of Their Majesties Coronation, in the Morning the Flag was hoisted on Bedford Tower, at Noon the Great Guns in His Majesty's Park the Phoenix were fired Three Rounds,

and answered by Volleys from the Regiments in Garrison, which were drawn up in the Royal Square at the Barracks. In the Evening a Play was given by his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant for the Entertainment of the Ladies; and the Night concluded with Bonfires, Illuminations, and other Demonstrations of Joy.

Lisbon, September 13:

On Thursday last, the 11th Instant, about Half an Hour after Four o'Clock in the Afternoon, his Royal Highness the Prince of Brasil died of the Small-Pox.

Hague, September 19.

The Prince and Princess of Orange went Yesterday to the great Church in this Place, where a Sermon was preached before them on the Occasion of the Anniversary of the Revolution which took Place last Year. A grand Concert was afterwards performed in Celebration of that Event; and this Evening there was a Drawing-Room at the House in the Wood; where their Royal and Serene Highnesses received the Compliments of the Nobility, Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Distinction residing here.

 “ Turn him out Turn him out as no Blood mite not Be shed for the Sins Lieths at Your one Door Gx^e G^r

And that a few Days after the said incendiary Letter was found as above mentioned, viz. on the 29th Day of August, a Gun or Blunderbuss was fired off in the Middle of the Night nearly under the Bed-Chamber of the said George Garnier, Esq; whereby Two Panes of Glass in the Window of the Room immediately under the said Bed-Chamber were broken.

His Majesty, for the better apprehending and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in writing and laying the incendiary Letter above mentioned at the Door of the said George Garnier, and in firing off the Gun or Blunderbuss as aforesaid, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them (except the Person who actually wrote the said Letter, or fired off the said Gun or Blunderbuss,) who shall discover his or her Accomplice or Accomplices in either of the said Offences, so that he, she or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
