Notice is hereby given, that the Militia for the said County shall be drawn out on the Market-bill in the Town of Oakham in the said County, on Monday the 17th Day of November next, at Twelve o'Clock at Noon; at which Time and Place two Thirds of the Militia Men inrolled will be drawn out of the whole County; which two Thirds so chosen are to be trained and exercised for the Space of Twenty-eight Days together, beginning the said 17th of November next, ending on the 15th of December following; and if any Militia Man, not labouring under any Infirmity incapacitating him, shall not then and there appear and join the said Militia, every such Militia Man, who shall be convicted thereof, will incur the Penalty of Twenty Pounds, and on Non-Payment shall be liable to be committed to Goal; there to remain without Bail or Mainprize for the Space of Six Months, or until such Penalty shall have been paid. Notice to Mariners.

BY Order of the Commissioners appointed by Act of Parliament for erecting Four Light Houses on the Northern Parts of Great Britain,

Two Light Houses, with Lamps and Reflectors, are now erected:

One of them on Kinnaird Castle, at Kinnaird's Head, near Fraserburgh, on the East Coast of Scotland, Lat. 57. 42. and Long. 1. 20. West of London, Cairnbulg, from the Light House, bearing S. E. and Troup Point W. N. W.

The Lantern is 120 Feet above the Sea at High Water; will be seen from S. E. and W. N. W. and intermediate Points of the Compass, on the North of these Two Points, and has been lighted since the 1st of December last.

The other on the Mull of Cantyre, immediately above the Rocks, known to Seamen by the Name of the Merchants, Lat. 55. 22. and Long. West of London 5. 42.; the Sound of Isla from the Light House bearing, by the Compass, N. by E. and distant 27 Miles; the South End of Isla N. N. W. distant 25 Miles;

the North End of Rathlin Island N. W. by W. One-half W.; the Maiden Rocks S. by W. One-half W. distant 14 Miles; and Copland Light S. by W. One-half W. distant 31 Miles.

The Lantern is 235 Feet above the Sea at High Water; and will be seen from N. N. E. 1-4th E.; from S. by W. 1-4th W. and intermediate Points of the Compass, North of these Two Points.

The Lantern will be lighted every Night after the 1st Day of November next.
