*St. James's, November 29.*

**T**HIS Day the Royal Family removed from Windsor to Kew. His Majesty was attended in his Coach by General Harcourt, Colonel Goldsworthy, and Colonel Gréville.

Her Majesty went in her own Carriage, accompanied by Her Royal Highness the Princess Royal, and Her Royal Highness the Princess Augusta.

Their Royal Highnesses the Prince of Wales and the Duke of York followed soon after.

*Kew, November 30.*

Yesterday at Half an Hour after Five in the Afternoon His Majesty arrived at this Place from Windsor, and bore the Journey extremely well.

His Majesty's State of Health remains the same To-day as it was Yesterday.

His Majesty has had some Sleep at Intervals. The Disorder still continues, with some little Abatement.

The Gentlemen to wear Black Coats, and Black, or plain White, or White and Gold, or White and Silver Stuff Waistcoats, full trimmed, coloured Swords and Buckles.
