Notice to the Public.

THERE is just erected, on the Pier Head of Port Patrick, a small Light-House, with a Reflector Lamp; Thirty Feet above the Level of the Sea, which will be lighted the 1st of December, and continue to be lighted till the 1st of May. In future it will be lighted from the 1st of September to the 1st of May.

The Mull of Galloway bearing from said Light South and by East. The Copland or Donaghadee Light on the Coast of Ireland, West and by South.

The Mull of Kintyre in Argyle Shire, N. N. West.
