HIS Majesty became calm before Noon Yesterday, and was remarkably composed during the Rest of the Day. His Majesty has slept Seven Hours, but is as usual this Morning.

His Majesty passed the greatest Part of Yesterday in a State of Composure, has had a restless Night, but is calm this Morning.

Kew, January 20.

His Majesty had not a good Night, and is not calm this Morning.

Orders for the Court's going into Mourning on Thursday next, the 22d Instant, for his late Catholick Majesty; and also for his late Serene Highness Prince Frederick Henry of Prussia, Margrave of Brandenburg Schwedt, viz.

The Ladies to wear Black Silk, fringed or plain Linen, White Gloves, Necklaces and Earrings, Black or White Shoes, Fans and Tippets.

Undress, White or Grey Luffings, Tabbies or Damasks.

The Gentlemen to wear Black full trimmed, fringed or plain Linen, Black Swords and Buckies.

Undress, Grey Frocks.

The Court to change the Mourning on Thursday the 29th Instant for his late Catholick Majesty, and for his late Serene Highness the Margrave of Brandenburg Schwedt; and at the same Time to go into Mourning for her late Royal Highness the Infanta Donna Maria Anne Victoria, and his late Royal Highness the Infant Don Gabriel, of Spain; and also for his late Serene Highness Prince William Lewis of Baden Dourlach, Brother to the Reigning Margrave, viz.

The Ladies to wear Black Silk or Velvet, coloured Ribbons, Fans and Tippets, or plain White, or

White and Gold, or White and Silver Stuffs, with Black Ribbons,

The Gentlemen to wear Black Coats, and Black, or plain White, or White and Gold, or White and Silver Stuff Waistcoats, full trimmed, coloured Swords and Buckles.

And on Sunday the 1st of February next the Court to go out of Mourning.

St. Petersburg, December 23.

This being the Anniversary of the Birth-Day of his Imperial Highness the Great Duke Alexander Paulovitz, as also of her Imperial Highness the Great Dutchess Helena Paulowna, it was celebrated at Court this Morning, in Grand Gala, and in the Evening there will be a Ball.

Madrid, December 26.

The first Care of his present Majesty, when he received the unwelcome News of his August Father's Death, was, that the Body should be interred with proper Solemnity and State. His Excellency the Marquis de Santa Cruz, Chief Steward of the King's Household, was appointed to conduct the Funeral Ceremony, and his Excellency the Marquis of Valdecasana, his Majesty's Chamberlain, to give the necessary Directions for the Delivery of the Body to the Chief Steward.

Their Excellencies the Marquis de Cogulludo, the Marquis de Villadarias, and the Dukes of Montelano, and Granada de Ega, Lords of the Bedchamber in Waiting, attended by Nine Gentlemen of the Bedchamber, laid out the Body in the Presence of the Chamberlain, placed on it the Ribbands and Collars of the different Orders of the Holy Ghost, Saint Januarius Constantine, the Golden Fleece, and Charles the Third, and laid it in a Lead Coffin, cased in a Wooden one, under Two Keys, and covered with a Tissue Cloth. On the 14th of December, at a Quarter past Five in the Evening, the Body was removed by the Lords in Waiting, summoned for the Purpose, and others in the Service of his Majesty, preceded by the Chamberlain, from his Majesty's Bedchamber

Bedchamber to his Dressing Room, in the Presence of his Excellency Don Pedro Lopez de Sereña, one of his Majesty's Council of State, Minister of the Finances, and Chief Notario of the Kingdoms of Castille and Leon, and ordered by his Majesty to be present on such Occasions. The Chamberlain, there, according to the Ceremony prescribed, made a formal Delivery of the Body to the Chief Steward, who was waiting to receive it, attended by the Under Stewards, named for the Service of the Week in the King's Apartments. These, and the Lords and Gentlemen of the Bedchamber, conducted it to the Ambassador's Saloon, hung with rich Tapestry, and further fitted for the Solemnity by the Addition of Seven Altars, and on a Part of the Floor, raised and covered, a State Bed, on which the Body was laid. Here the Chief Steward, with like Ceremony, gave it in Charge to the ancient and noble Guard of the *Monteros de Espinosa*, to be re-delivered to his Excellency at a proper Time, for the Purpose of being conveyed to the Royal Monastery at the Escorial. The *Moultros* immediately entered on their Office, Two at the Head, with the Crown and Sceptre, and Two at the Feet; and besides these, Two Stewards of the Household for the Week attended as Guards, and relieved each other: The Body Guards and Exempt Officers were also alternately present; and their Captain, his Excellency Prince de Maferano, was not once absent from the Time the Body was first entrusted to the Guard, to that of its Interment at St. Lorenzo.

At Six in the Evening his Excellency Don Antonio, Lord Bishop of Sentmanar, Patriarch of the Indies, and Chief Almoner to his Majesty, entered the Saloon in his Pontifical Habit, followed by the Priests and Musicians of the Royal Chapel, the Lords of the Bedchamber, the Chief Steward of the Household, and the Under Stewards for the Week. The Service for the Dead was then performed, and the Doors afterwards thrown open to as many of every Description as were willing to see their deceased Monarch.

At Five the next Morning, (Monday the 15th) the Religious Communities of the Dominicans, Franciscans, Augustines, and Carmelites, began to assemble in Order, and when the Priests of the Royal Chapel had retired, each Community sang Part of the Service for the Dead, and returned in like Order in the Evening to repeat it. As many Masses as the Time would allow of were celebrated at the Six lesser Altars in the Morning of the same Day.

The Day following Mass was again performed by his Excellency the Lord Archbishop of Corinth, Nuncio from his Holiness the Pope in these Kingdoms; the Priests of the Royal Chapel sang Part of the Service for the Dead; and Two other Masses were celebrated by the Priests of the Royal Convent, of bare-footed Friars, and those of the Incarnation.

When the Church Ceremonies were concluded, a Meeting was held of the Illustrious Order of the Golden Fleece, composed of Eight Knights, and the Register, the Count of Castellblanco. The Senior Knight took the Collar of the Order from the Coffin, which his Majesty had worn as Chief and Sovereign.

The same Ceremony was performed by Eight Knights, Great Cross Bearers, of the Royal and distinguished Spanish Order of Charles the Third, of which his Majesty was the Founder. Both Collars were given to the Custody of the Keeper of the Jewels. The other Collars were taken away without Ceremony, no other of the respective Knights being present.

From that Time, only a few Persons of Distinction were admitted, who met to determine at what Hour the Body should be removed. At Three on Tuesday Afternoon the Priests of the King's Chapel, with the Most Illustrious Don Augustin Rubin de Cevallos, Lord Bishop of Jaen and Inquisitor General, assisted at Part of the Service for the Dead; and the Funeral Procession began to form in the Palace Court. The Robes of the different Orders, and the Hat, which had remained with the Body, were now taken away, and the Body itself removed by the Lords of the Bedchamber, and the Stewards of the Household, to the Top of the Stairs, from whence it was taken to the Bottom by the Gentlemen Pensioners. There it was received by his Excellency the Marquis de Villena, Chief Master of the Horse, and the Marquis de S. Leonardo, his Majesty's First Equerry, who covered the Coffin with the Tissue Cloth that had been used for the same Purpose in the Saloon. The Body, still attended by the Guards and Gentlemen that had surrounded it when on the State Bed, was put into the Carriage waiting for it, which in the Front of the Palace joined the Cavalcade, drawn up in the following Order.

1. The Company of Royal Spanish Body Guards, commanded by the Standard Bearer Don Laurencio Sanchez.
2. The Company of Royal Flemish Body Guards, commanded by the Standard Bearer Don Santiago Cumes.
3. Twelve Friars from each of the Orders of Dominicans, Franciscans, Carmelites, and Augustines, on Horseback, with Tapers.
4. The Judges of the Palace and Court, Don Joseph Lopez Oliver, and Don Luis Melgarejo, preceded by the Constables and other Officers of Justice.
5. The Gentlemen Pensioners on Horseback.
6. The Kettle-Drums and Trumpets of the Royal Cavalry, muffled, and in the Middle the Royal Standard, borne by one of his Majesty's Equerries.
7. The Patriarchal Cross, and on each Side Two Equerries with Tapers.
8. Twelve Chaplains of Honour to his Majesty on Horseback, with the Band, &c. of the Royal Chapel.
9. Twelve of his Majesty's Servants on Foot, between the Ranks, with lighted Torches.
10. Four of his Majesty's Stewards of the Household.
11. His Excellency the Duke of Alberquerque, the Marquis de Villadarias, the Count de Altemira, the Dukes de Ossuna, de Montellano, and Granada de Ega, the Count de Mora, the Marquis de Belgida, and the Marquis Alconchels, all Grandees of Spain and Lords of the Bedchamber, who voluntarily made Part of the Procession to the Escorial.

12. Their Excellencies the Marquis de S. Leonardo, the Count de Aranda, the Duke de Hijar and del Arco, who, being the oldest Lords of the Bedchamber, were ordered by his present Majesty to attend the Body.

13. Four Cadets of the Pioneers of the Royal Body Guards.

14. The Inspector of the Royal Stables.

15. The BODY.

16. On each Side of the Body, Four of his Majesty's Equerries on Horseback.

17. In the same Order, Four Caballerizos de Campo.

18. Two Monteros of the Bedchamber at the Steps of the Carriage that bore the Body.

19. His Excellency the Marquis de Santa Cruz, Chief Steward of the Household; his Excellency the Prince de Maferano, Captain of the Guard; and the Most Illustrious Lord Bishop of Jaen, Inquisitor General, as Prelate of the Procession.

20. Twenty Men from the Royal Life Guards, as Escort to the Body, commanded by Second Lieutenant Don John Vandervelen, of the Flemish Company, and the Exempt Baron de Amerstad, with a Subaltern.

21. The Italian Squadron of the Corps of Royal Life Guards, commanded by the Standard Bearer Don Joseph Sexti; this Squadron and the two others of Life Guards abovementioned were under the Orders of his Excellency, the Marquis de Miravel, Adjutant General of the Royal Corps of Life Guards.

22. His Majesty's State Coach.

23. Nine Coaches belonging to the Attendants.

24. Four Grooms, and other Officers of the Royal Stables, and of the Household, to be ready in case of Necessity on the Way.

The Infantry Companies of Royal Spanish and Walloon Guards, and the Regiments of Infantry in Garrison at Madrid, with their Arms reversed, and Funeral Music, were filed on each Side of the Way through such Parts of Madrid where the Procession was to pass, viz. under the Gate of the Arsenal, the Street *del Sacramento*, the Place de *Puerta Cerrada*, and the Street and Gate de Segovia; beyond which the Prince's Regiment of Cavalry was drawn up in Battalion: The usual Salute was made by Ten Pieces of Cannon, placed under the Palace *del Buen Retiro* on his Majesty's Demise, besides one which was discharged every Quarter of an Hour, according to the established Ceremonial. The Procession proceeded by the new Walk by St. Vincent's Gate, to the Pardo Road, St. Fernando Bridge, and the New Castille Road. At Half past Nine it arrived at the Village of Galapagar, the only Place where it was to halt, and where the Body was deposited in the Parish Church, and attended by the Life Guards, the Halberdiers, Two Companies of the Spanish and Walloon Guards, the Monteros of the Bedchamber, and all those whose Duty it was to be present. At Half past Five the next Morning (Wednesday) the Order of the Procession was resumed, and at Half after Eight the Whole arrived at the Royal Monastery of St. Lorenzo, where Two Companies of Spanish and Walloon Guards were in waiting; and at the principal Gate of the Monastery, a Guard from

the Corps of Royal Body Guards, commanded by his Excellency the Marquis de Ruchena the Major. The Three Squadrons of Guards that had escorted the Body on the Road, drew up in Front of the Monastery. When the Carriage flopt, it was taken out by the Gentlemen Pensioners, assisted by the *Caballerizos de Campo*, and received by the Community with lighted Tapers, headed by the R. F. Prior and his Assistants, in their Choir Hoods, bearing the Cross, and the Candlesticks. The Coffin containing the Royal Corpse being placed on a Table, the Steward of the Household produced the Letter written by his present Majesty to the R. F. Prior, informing him of the Death of the King his Father, and of his having sent the Body to that Monastery to be interred with the usual Solemnity. The Prior read the Letter aloud in the Presence of the People, the Steward of the Household standing on one Side, and the *Notario Mayor* on the other. The Priests of the Royal Chapel, with the Inquisitor-General, then sang the Prayer for the Dead, the Captain of the Guard standing at the Head of the Coffin; the Lords of the Bedchamber and other Attendants at the Sides. The King's Priests then retired, and the Monastery Choir began the *Miserere*, while the Gentlemen Pensioners took the Body to the first Door, from whence it was carried on by the Lords of the Bedchamber and the Stewards of the Household to the Bier in the Center of the Chapel. When the Body was placed on the Bier, Four Monteros of the Bedchamber stood round it, two before without any Insignia, and two behind with the Crown and Sceptre. The Captain of the Guards, several Officers and others placed themselves at the Head of the Coffin, a Guard from that Corps, their Arms shouldered, at the Sides, and two Cadets in the Front. Between them and the Bier were the Judges who accompanied the Procession; and a Guard of Halberdiers completed the Circle.

The Service in the Choir and the Mass being ended, the Prior returned to the Attendants, and the Community descended to the Body of the Chapel, where they sang Three Prayers for the Repose of the Soul, and the Laudes.

They then proceeded to inter the Body. The Lords of the Bedchamber, assisted by the Steward of the Household, and followed by a great Number of the Attendants, removed it to the Pantheon. It was there placed on a Table at the Foot of the Altar. The Chief Steward opened the Wooden Coffin, looked at his Majesty's Face through a Chrystal fixed in the Lead Coffin, and then, with due Formality, consigned the Body to the Prior, and his Assistants.

The Captain of the Guard thus assured of the Death of the King, broke his Staff of Office, as is usual on such Occasions; and the three Companies of Body Guards, with the two Grenadier Companies of Spanish and Walloon Guards, fired three Volleys, which concluded the Ceremony.

The Whole was over about half past Twelve o'Clock, on Wednesday the 17th of December.
