The KING's Most Excellent Majely in Council. HEREAS by an Act paffed in the Twenty-W lighth Year of the Reign of His prefent Majefty, intituled, "An Act for regulating the "Trade between the Subjects of His Majefty's "Colonies and Plantations in North America and " in the West India Islands and the Countries be Ionging to the United States of America; and "between His Majesty's faid Subjects and the Foreign Islands in the West Indies," it is, amongst other Things, enacted, That it shall and may be lawful for His Majelty in Council, by Order or Orders, to be issued and published from Time to Time, to authorize, or by Warrant or Warrants under His Sign Manual, to impower the Governor of Newfoundland for the Time being to authorize, in Cafe of Neceffity, the Importation into New-foundland of Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, and Live Stock, from any of the Territories belonging to the faid United States, for the Supply of the Inhabi-tants and Fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland, for the then enfuing Seafon only; provided always, that fuch Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, and Live Stock, fo authorized to be imported into the Island of Newfoundland, shall not be imported, except in Conformity to fuch Rules, Regulations and Refirictions as shall be specified in such Order or Orders, Warrant or Warrants respectively, and except by British Subjects and in British built Ships owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law: And whereas it is expedient and neceffary that Provision be made for fully supplying the Inhabitants and Fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland for the enfuing Seafon with Bread, Flour, and Indian Corn; His Majefty doth thereupon, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order and declare, That for the Supply of the In-habitants and Fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland, for the enfuing Seafon only, Bread, Flour and Indian Corn be imported into the faid Ifland from any of the Territories belonging to the faid United States, by British Subjects, and in British built Ships owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law, and which shall, within the Space of Seven Months previous to the Time of fuch Importation, have cleared out from fome Port in Great Britain, or some other Port of His Majesty's Dominions in Europe, for which Purpofe a Licence thall have been granted by the Commillioners of His Majefty's Cuttoms in England or Scotland, or

AT the Court at Kew, the 13th of March, the Commissioners of His Majesty's Revenue in Irea land, or any other Person or Persons who may be duly authorized in that Kingdom respectively, in the Manner and Form hereinafter mentioned ; which Licences shall continue and be in Force for Seven Calendar Months from the Day of the Date upon catendar Months from the Day of the Date upon which they are refpectively granted, and no longer; provided that no fuch Licence as aforefaid, granted after the Thirtieth Day of June, One Thouland Seven Hundred and Eighty nine, shall be of any Force or Effect: And His Majesty is hereby fur-ther pleased to order, That the Master or Person having the Charge or Command of any Ship or Vecal to whom such Licence shall be granted thall Veffet to whom fuch Licence shall be granted, shall, upon the Arrival of the said Ship or Vessel at the Port, Harbour or Place in the Island of Newfoundland where he shall discharge such Bread, Flour, or Indian Corn, deliver up the faid Licence to the Collector or other proper Officer of the Cuftoms there, having first indorsed on the Back of such Licence the Marks, Numbers and Contents of each Package of Bread, Flour, or Indian Corn, under the Penalty of the Forfeiture in the faid A& mentioned. And the Collector or other proper Officer of the Cultoms at Newfoundland is hereby enjoined and required to give a Certificate to the Matter or Perion having the Charge or Command of fuch Ship or Veffel of his having received the faid Licence, fo indorfed as before directed, and to tranimit the same to the Committioners of His Majefty's Cuftoms in Eng-land or Scotland, or to the Committioners of His Majefty's Revenue in Ireland respectively, by whom fuch Licence was granted.

And whereas for Want of a fufficient Depth of Wa-ter the faid Tiers at Iron Gate have been found inconwenient, and in many Cafes improper:

The faid Commiffioners of His Majefty's Customs do therefore hereby give Notice to all Merchants, Owners, Mafters, Pilots and others concerned, that from and after the 5th Day of April next, all fuch Ships and Veffels are bereby ordered and directed to be meared at the Tiers off Gun Dock and Wapping Old Stairs, and not to depart therefrom until regularly cleared by the proper Officer or Officers of His Majesty's Customs, under the Penalty of FIFTY POUNDS; and imme-diately on such Vessels having been so cleared, they are to be removed from the said Tiers, that they may not interrupt others arriving with Tobacco.
