THE King has been pleased to order a Congé d'Elire to pass the Great Seal, empowering the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of St. Asaph to elect a Bishop of that See, void by the Death of the Right Reverend Dr. Jonathan Shipley, late Bishop thereof; and His Majesty has also been pleased, by His Royal Sign Manual, to recommend the Right Reverend Father in God Samuel now Bishop of Gloucester, to be by them chosen Bishop of that See.

The King has been pleased to present the Reverend Colin Mackenzie to the Church and Parish of Stornaway, vacant by the Transportation of the Reverend Mr. Downie to the Parish of Urray.

Also to present the Reverend Francis Leslie to the Church and Parish of Bohame, vacant by the Death of the late Minister there.
