WHEREAS His Majesty taking into His most serious Consideration the indispensable Duty which He owes to Almighty God for the manifold and inestimable Blessings which He has received at His Hands, and desiring to manifest to His faithful and loving Subjects, and to the World, the deep and devout Sentiments which He entertains of His late Mercies vouchsafed unto Him, by prostrating Himself before His Divine Majesty, and offering up, in the most public and solemn Manner, His Praises and Thanksgivings for that signal Interposition of His good Providence, which hath removed from Him the late Illness with which He has been afflicted, and which hath established and confirmed in Him His surest Trust and Confidence in His Protection, have thought fit, to issue His Royal Proclamation, thereby appointing and commanding that a General Thanksgiving to Almighty God, for these His Mercies, be observed throughout England, Wales and the Town of Berwick upon Tweed, on Thursday the Twenty-third Day of this Instant April:

And hath been pleased, by His Order in Council made at His Court at Windsor, on the Third Day of this instant April, to order that his Excellency the Marquis of Buckingham, the Lord Lieutenant of this His Majesty's Kingdom of Ireland, (or the Lords Justices of the said Kingdom for the Time being) do take Care that a Public Thanksgiving for His Majesty's Recovery be duly observed on the same Thursday the Twenty-third Day of this instant April, throughout this His said Kingdom, according to the usual Manner, conformable to what is directed to be done in England by His Majesty's said Proclamation in that Behalf:

We therefore, the Lord Lieutenant and Council of this His Majesty's Kingdom of Ireland, do issue this our Proclamation, hereby appointing and commanding that a General Thanksgiving to Almighty God, for these His aforesaid Mercies, be observed throughout this Kingdom on the said Thursday the Twenty-third Day of this instant April. And for the better and more orderly solemnizing the same, we have given Directions to the Most Reverend the Archbishops and the Right Reverend the Bishops of this Kingdom, to compose a Form of Prayer suitable to the Occasion, to be used in all Churches and Chapels, and other Places of Public Worship, and to take Care for the timely Dispersing the same throughout their respective Dioceses.

And we do strictly charge and command that the said Public Day of Thanksgiving be religiously observed by all His Majesty's loving Subjects, of this Kingdom, as they tender the Favour of Almighty God, and upon Pain of suffering such Punishment as can be justly inflicted upon all such as shall contrain or neglect the same.
