This Day Monſ. Bukaty had a Private Audience of His Maſteſty to deliver his new Letters of Credence, giving him the Character of Envoy Extraordinary and Miniſter Plenipotentiary from the King and the Republic of Poland:

To which he was introduced by his Grace the Duke of Leeds, His Maſteſty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, and conducted by Stephen Cottrell, Eſq; Aſſiſtant Maſter of the Ceremonies.

Whitehall, May 2.

The King has been pleased to constitute and appoint the Earl of Leven to be His Majesty's High Commissioner to the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland.

The King has been pleased to grant to the Right Honourable Edward Lord Eliot His Royal Licence and Authority, that he and his Issue may take and use the Surname and bear the Arms of Craggs, in Addition to those of Eliot, and that he may hereafter subscribe the Name of Craggs before all Titles of Honour, pursuant to the Will of Ann Nugent, sometime Wife of Robert Nugent, Esq; afterwards Earl Nugent, eldest of the Three Daughters of James Craggs, Esq; formerly Post-Master General, and one of the Three Sisters and Coheirs of the Right Honourable James Craggs, formerly Secretary of State; such Arms being first duly exemplified according to the Laws of Arms, and recorded in the Heralds Office.

The King has also been pleased to grant to Dudley Long, of Saxmundham, in the County of Suffolk, Esq; and his Issue, His Royal Licence and Authority to take and use the Surname of North, pursuant to the Will of his Aunt, the Honourable Ann Herbert, deceased, Sister and Coheirs of Dudley North, late of Little Glenham, in the said County, Esq; deceased.

And also to order that these His Majesty's several Concessions and Declarations be registered in His College of Arms.
