The King has also been pleased to grant to Dudley Long, of Saxmundham, in the County of Suffolk, Elg; and his Islue, His Royal Licence and Authority to take and use the Surname of North, purfuant to the Will of his Aunt, the Honourable Ann Herbert, deceased, Sister and Coheiress of Dudley North, late of Little Glenham, in the faid County, Elq; deceased.

And also to order that these His Majesty's feveral Concessions and Declarations be registered in His College of Arms.
