Letters are received from Prince de Hohenlohe, dated Hermannstadt the 14th of this Month, mentioning that Colonel Mayerheim having received Intelligence on the 8th, that 7000 Turks were on their March to attack the advanced Post of Vallie-mulieri, defended by only 200 Fusiliers and Chasseurs, had resolved to abandon it; and that the Enemy having attempted to harass this small Corps in their Retreat, were so warmly received by the Chasseurs and a Party of Hussars detached to their Assistance, as to be obliged to desist with the Loss of 253 Men killed, whilst the Austrians lost only one Man killed, and had nine wounded.
