THE following Address of the Governor, Assitants and Fellowship of Merchants Adventurers of England, residing in Hamburg, having been transmitted by Emanuel Mathias, Esq; His Majesty's Minister Plenipotentiary to the Circle of Lower Saxony, to his Grace the Duke of Leeds, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, has been by him presented to the King: Which Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Governor, Assitants and Fellowship of Merchants Adventurers of England, residing in Hamburg, in General Court assembled, beg Leave to offer to your Majesty our sincere Congratulations, that by a signal Interposition of Divine Providence your Majesty is again restored to perfect Health, and to the Government of your Kingdoms, the Anxiety of your most Amiable Consort and Illustrious Family is removed, and your loving Subjects are relieved from Alarm and Despondency.

Penetrated ourselves with the most lively Emotions of Joy on this important Event, we have the farther Gratification to observe, that in this Place, amongst People of all Nations, there is but one Sentiment which accords with our own; and we exult in the Thought that for such universal Sympathy there must be an adequate Cause.

We ardently wish that your Majesty, in the full Enjoyment of every public and domestic Felicity, may long continue to reign in the Hearts of a loyal, united and happy People, and that you may have the Glory and Satisfaction to promote and maintain the Peace of the World.
