AT the Court at *Kew*, the 15th Day of *May*, 1789,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

THIS Day the Right Honourable Sir William Wynne, was, by His Majesty's Command, sworn of His Majesty's most Honourable Privy Council, and took his Place at the Board accordingly.

His Majesty having been pleased to appoint George Duke of Montagu to be Lord Lieutenant of the County of Huntingdon, his Grace this Day took the Oaths appointed to be taken thereupon, instead of the Oaths of Allegiance and Supremacy.

His Majesty in Council was this Day pleased to appoint Thomas Fowell Buxton, of Earls Colne, Esquire, to be Sheriff of the County of Essex, in the Room of Henry Mertins Bird, of Dagenham, Esquire; William Taylor, of Tillington, Esquire, to be Sheriff of the County of Hereford, in the Room of Thomas Clutton, of Kinnerley, Esquire; and George Templar, of Shapwick, Esquire, to be Sheriff of the County of Somerset, in the Room of Henry Hippeley Coxe, of Downside, Esquire.

The King has been pleased to appoint the Right Honourable Alleyne Fitz-Herbert, to be His Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary to the States General of the United Provinces.

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Ministers and Elders of the Provincial Synod of Lothian and Tweedale, take this Opportunity of our first Meeting to congratulate your Majesty on your happy Recovery from a late alarming Illness, and beg Leave to approach your Throne on this joyful Occasion with Hearts full of Gratitude to Almighty God, and warm with Sentiments of Loyalty and Affection to your Majesty.
