HEREAS by an Act passed in this present Session of Parliament, intituled, "An Act to enable His Majesty to authorize, in Case of Necessity, the Importation of Bread, Flour, In-" dian Corn, and Live Stock from any of the Terri-" tories belonging to the United States of America "into the Province of Quebec, and all the Countries bordering on the Gulf of St. Lawrence,
and the Islands within the faid Gulf, and to the
Coast of Labrador," it is enacted, That it shall and may be lawful for His Majesty in Council, by Order or Orders, to be issued and published from Time to Time, to authorize, in Case of Necessity, the bringing or importing of Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, and Live Stock, as well into the Province of Quebec as into all the Countries bordering on the Gulf of St. Lawrence, and into the Islands within the said Gulf, and also to the Coast of Labrador, for the then ensuing Season only, from any of the Territories belonging to the United States of America, for the Supply of the Persons employed in the Fisheries there carried on; provided always, that fuch Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, and Live Stock, so authorized to be imported or brought, shall not be imported or brought, except in Conformity to fuch Rules, Regulations and Restrictions as shall be specified in such Order or Orders, and except by British Subjects and in British built Ships owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law: And whereas it is expedient and necessary that Provision be made for fully supplying the Persons employed in carrying on the said Fisheries for the ensuing Scason with Bread, Flour, and Indian Corn; His Majesty doth thereupon, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order and declare, That for the

faid Fisheries, for the ensuing Season only, Bread, Flour and Indian Corn be allowed to be imported and brought as well into the faid Province of Quebec as into all the Countries bordering on the Gulf of St. Lawrence, and into the Islands within the faid Gulf, and also to the Coast of Labrador, from any of the Territories belonging to the said United States, by British Subjects, and in British built Ships owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law, and which shall, within the Space of Seven Months previous to the Time of such Importation, have cleared out from some Port in Great Britain, or some other Port of His Majesty's Do-minions in Europe, for which Purpose a Licence shall have been granted by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs in England or Scotland, or the Commissioners of His Majesty's Revenue in Ireland, or any other Person or Persons who may be duly authorized in that Kingdom respectively, in the Manner and Form hereinafter mentioned; which Licences shall continue and be in Force for Seven Calendar Months from the Day of the Date upon which they are respectively granted, and no longer; provided that no such Licence as aforesaid, granted after the Fourteenth Day of July, One Thousand Seven Hundred and Eighty nine, shall be of any Force or Effect: And His Majesty is hereby further pleased to order, That the Master or Person having the Charge or Command of any Ship or Veffel to whom such Licence shall be granted, shall, upon the Arrival of the said Ship or Vessel at the Port, Harbour or Place in the faid Province, Countries, Islands or Coast where he shall discharge such Bread, Flour, or Indian Corn, deliver up the faid Licence to the Collector or other proper Officer of the Customs there, or in Case there shall be no Officer of the Customs, to the Naval Officer at such Port, Harbour, or Place, having first indorsed on the Back of such Licence the Marks, Numbers and Contents of each Package of Bread, Flour, or Indian Corn, under the Penalty of the Forfeiture in the said Act mentioned. And the Collector or other proper Officer of the Customs, or Naval Officer, at such Port, Harbour, or Place, is hereby enjoined and required to give a Certificate to the Matter or Person having the Charge or Command of such Ship or Vessel of his having received the said Licence, so indorsed as before directed, and to transmit the same to the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs in England or Scotland, or to the Commissioners of His Majesty's Revenue in Ireland respectively, by Supply of the Persons employed in carrying on the whom such Licence was granted. And the Right Honorable

Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

Now be it known that the faid [Person's Name] hath Licence to lade on board the faid Ship, [Ship's Name], at and from any Port or Place belonging to the United States of America, Bread, Flour, and Indian Corn, the Produce of the faid United States, and no other Article whatfoever, and to carry the faid Bread, Flour, and Indian Corn, to some Port or Place in the Province of Quebec, or the Countries bordering on the Gulf of St. Law-rence, or in the Islands there, or on the Coast of Labrador, and on the Arrival of the faid Ship at any Port, Harbour, or Place of Discharge in the faid Province, Countries, Islands, or Coast, the Master or Person having the Charge or Command of the faid Ship is required and enjoined to deliver up the faid Licence to the Collector or other proper Officer of His Majesty's Customs there, or, in Case there shall be no Officer of the Customs, to the Naval Officer at fuch Port, Harbour, or Place, and to endorse on the Back thereof the Marks, Numbers, and Contents of each Package of Bread, Flour, or Indian Corn, and shall thereupon receive a Certificate thereof from the faid Collector or other proper Officer of the Customs.

Yesterday being appointed for celebrating Her Majesty's Birth-Day, the Flag was displayed on Bedford Tower; the Great Guns at the Salute Battery in His Majesty's Park the Phœnix were fired Three Rounds, and answered by Vollies from the Regiments in Garrison, which were drawn up in the Royal Square at the Barracks. In the Evening a Play was given by his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant for the Entertainment of the Ladies; and at Night there were Bonfires, Illuminations, and all other Demonstrations of Joy throughout the City.

Constantinople, April 7.

Yesterday Evening, between Nine and Ten o'Clock, the Grand Signior was taken ill with a fainting Fit, which proved to be a Stroke of Apoplexy, and baffled all the Efforts of the Physicians; the Sultan expired at Half an Hour after Six this Morning. Information of this Event having been transmitted to the Porte, the Musty, the Captain Pashaw and the other Grandees assembled in the Seraglio about Eight o'Clock, and paid Homage to the now Reigning Sultan, Selim the Third, (born in 1761) whole Accession to the Ottoman Throne, attended with the usual Ceremonies, was announced by the Cannon of the Seragio. The Remains of the deceased Sultan were deposited, at Twelve o'Clock, in the magnificent Tomb prepared by his Order feveral Years fince, for himself and his Children.

St. Petersburgh, April 24.

General in Chief Count Moushkin Poushkin set out Yesterday to take upon him the Command of the Army in Finland. Lieutenant-General Michelfon, second in Command, also joined that Army a few Days ago.

Stockholm, May 5.

Yesterday the Anniversary of the Institution of the Order of the Seraphim was celebrated in the usual Manner, and in an extraordinary Chapter his Majesty nominated and invested the Bishops of Gotenburgh, Abo and Hernofand with the Order of the Polar Star, and the Vice-Marshal of the Diet, Mons. de Liljehern, with the great Yellow Ribbon. Captain Morian and Major Jagerhorn were at the same Time invested with the little Cross of the Order of the Sword, and the Mailer of the Ceremonies, Mons. de Bedoire, with that of the Polar Star.
