The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act paſſed in this preſent Seſſion of Parliament, intituled, "An Act " to enable His Majesty to authorize, in Caſe of " Neceſſity, the Importation of Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, and Live Stock from any of the Territories belonging to the United States of America " into the Province of Quebec, and all the Countries bordering on the Gulf of St. Lawrence, " and the Iſlands within the ſaid Gulf, and to the " Coaſt of Labrador," it is enacted, That it ſhall and may be lawful for His Majesty in Council, by Order or Orders, to be iſſued and publiſhed from Time to Time, to authorize, in Caſe of Neceſſity, the bringing or importing of Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, and Live Stock, as well into the Province of Quebec as into all the Countries bordering on the Gulf of St. Lawrence, and into the Iſlands within the ſaid Gulf, and alſo to the Coaſt of Labrador, for the then enſuing Season only, from any of the Territories belonging to the United States of America, for the Supply of the Perſons employed in the Fiſheries there carried on; provided always, that ſuch Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, and Live Stock, ſo authorized to be imported or brought, ſhall not be imported or brought, except in Conformity to ſuch Rules, Regulations and Reſtrictions as ſhall be ſpecified in ſuch Order or Orders, and except by Britiſh Subjects and in Britiſh-built Ships owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law: And whereas it is expedient and neceſſary that Proviſion be made for fully ſupplying the Perſons employed in carrying on the ſaid Fiſheries for the enſuing Season with Bread, Flour, and Indian Corn; His Majesty doth thereupon, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order and declare, That for the Supply of the Perſons employed in carrying on the

ſaid Fiſheries, for the enſuing Season only, Bread, Flour and Indian Corn be allowed to be imported and brought as well into the ſaid Province of Quebec as into all the Countries bordering on the Gulf of St. Lawrence, and into the Iſlands within the ſaid Gulf, and alſo to the Coaſt of Labrador, from any of the Territories belonging to the ſaid United States, by Britiſh Subjects, and in Britiſh built Ships owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law, and which ſhall, within the Space of Seven Months previous to the Time of ſuch Importation, have cleared out from ſome Port in Great Britain, or ſome other Port of His Majesty's Dominions in Europe, for which Purpoſe a Licence ſhall have been granted by the Commiſſioners of His Majesty's Customs in England or Scotland, or the Commiſſioners of His Majesty's Revenue in Ireland, or any other Perſon or Perſons who may be duly authorized in that Kingdom reſpectively, in the Manner and Form hereinafter mentioned; which Licences ſhall continue and be in Force for Seven Calendar Months from the Day of the Date upon which they are reſpectively granted, and no longer; provided that no ſuch Licence as aforeſaid, granted after the Fourteenth Day of July, One Thouſand Seven Hundred and Eighty nine, ſhall be of any Force or Effect: And His Majesty is hereby further pleaſed to order, That the Maſter or Perſon having the Charge or Command of any Ship or Veſſel to whom ſuch Licence ſhall be granted, ſhall, upon the Arrival of the ſaid Ship or Veſſel at the Port, Harbour or Place in the ſaid Province, Countries, Iſlands or Coaſt where he ſhall diſcharge ſuch Bread, Flour, or Indian Corn, deliver up the ſaid Licence to the Collector or other proper Officer of the Customs there, or in Caſe there ſhall be no Officer of the Customs, to the Naval Officer at ſuch Port, Harbour, or Place, having firſt indorſed on the Back of ſuch Licence the Marks, Numbers and Contents of each Package of Bread, Flour, or Indian Corn, under the Penalty of the Forfeiture in the ſaid Act mentioned. And the Collector or other proper Officer of the Customs, or Naval Officer, at ſuch Port, Harbour, or Place, is hereby enjoined and required to give a Certificate to the Maſter or Perſon having the Charge or Command of ſuch Ship or Veſſel of his having received the ſaid Licence, ſo indorſed as before directed, and to tranſmit the ſame to the Commiſſioners of His Majesty's Customs in England or Scotland, or to the Commiſſioners of His Majesty's Revenue in Ireland reſpectively, by whom ſuch Licence was granted. Dublin Castle, May 19, 1789.

Yesterday being appointed for celebrating Her Majesty's Birth-Day, the Flag was displayed on Bedford Tower; the Great Guns at the Salute Battery in His Majesty's Park the Phoenix were fired Three Rounds, and answered by Volleys from the Regiments in Garrison, which were drawn up in the Royal Square at the Barracks. In the Evening a Play was given by his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant for the Entertainment of the Ladies; and at Night there were Bonfires, Illuminations, and all other Demonstrations of Joy throughout the City.

Constantinople, April 7.

Yesterday Evening, between Nine and Ten o'Clock, the Grand Signior was taken ill with a fainting Fit, which proved to be a Stroke of Apoplexy, and baffled all the Efforts of the Physicians; the Sultan expired at Half an Hour after Six this Morning. Information of this Event having been transmitted to the Porte, the Musty, the Captain Pashaw and the other Grandees assembled in the Seraglio about Eight o'Clock, and paid Homage to the now Reigning Sultan, Selim the Third, (born in 1761) whose Accession to the Ottoman Throne, attended with the usual Ceremonies, was announced by the Cannon of the Seraglio. The Remains of the deceased Sultan were deposited, at Twelve o'Clock, in the magnificent Tomb prepared by his Order several Years since, for himself and his Children.

St. Petersburg, April 24.

General in Chief Count Moushkin Poushkin set out Yesterday to take upon him the Command of the Army in Finland. Lieutenant-General Michelson, second in Command, also joined that Army a few Days ago.

Stockholm, May 5.

Yesterday the Anniversary of the Institution of the Order of the Seraphim was celebrated in the usual Manner, and in an extraordinary Chapter his Majesty nominated and invested the Bishops of Gotenburgh, Abo and Hernosand with the Order of the Polar Star, and the Vice-Marshal of the Diet, Monf. de Liljehern, with the great Yellow Ribbon. Captain Morian and Major Jagerhorn were at the same Time invested with the little Cross of the Order of the Sword, and the Master of the Ceremonies, Monf. de Bedoire, with that of the Polar Star.
