Permit us then, great Sire, though placed by the Ordination of Heaven without the Bounds of your Majesty's Dominions, to testify the real Sentiments and Feelings of our Minds on this happy Occasion, and to certify your Majesty that, (consistent with the Duties we owe to the Government under which we live,) we are never unmindful of our Native Land, or indifferent to its most valuable Interests.
