enjoy, was principally owing to the Glorious Revolu-tion under the late King William the Third; and that the very happy Accession of the Illustrious House of Hanover to the British Throne confirmed and ensured the Continuance of this Bleffing to us.

We and our Congregations have already, in many Instances, experienced the benign Esfects of your Majetty's most mild and gentle Government; and we bless the Great Disposer of all Good, that He has graciously heard our Prayers, and spared your precious Life to guard the Civil and Religious Liberty of

your People.

Your Majesty may be affured of our zealous Attachment to your Royal Person, Family and Government, and that we shall at all Times retain the liveliest Sense, and inculcate upon the numerous Congregations under our pastoral Care, the lively Recol-lection of the fignal Blessings which they and we have experienced, and the many Favours conferred on this Country in the Course of your Majesty's propitious and glorious Reign.

We shall always look upon it as our Duty to offer up our most hamble Prayers to the King of Kings, that He may continue your Majesty long to be a Bleffing to your numerous Family, and the Father of your People; and that the Illustrious House of Hanover may not want a King to fit upon the Throne of

Britain for ever.
