Yesterday being the Anniversary of His Majesty's Birth-Day, the Flag was difplayed on Bedford Tower; the Great Guns at the Salute Battery in His Majefty's Park the Phoenix were fired Three Rounds, and aniwered by Vollies from the Regiments

ments in Garrifon, which were drawn out in the Royal Square at the Barracks. At Noon there was a very numerous Affembly of the Nobility and other Perfons of Diffinction at the Caffle, who appeared in great Splendor, to compliment his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant, before whom an Ode, fet to Mufic, was performed. In the Evening a Play was given by his Excellency to the Ladies.; and at Night there were Bonfires, Illuminations, and all other Demonfirations of Joy throughout the City.

St. Petersburgh, May 15.

The Son of General Kamenskoy, who commands the Army in Moldavia, arrived here Yesterday with the News, that on the 27th of April General Derfelden compelled the Turks to retreat to within Twenty Werst of Brailla, near Mackfunene, on the River Sireth. In this Astion Four Hundred of the Enemy were killed, and a confiderable Number drowned. A Pacha of Two Tails, who commanded in Moldavia, was taken Prifoner, with about One Hundred Men, One Piece of Cannon, and Three Standards.

A fecond Courier arrived this Day from General Kamenskoy, with an Account that, on the 30th of April, General Derselden had attacked the Enemy in their Camp near Galatz, on the Danube, and that, after an obstinate Engagement of more than Three Hours, he had totally defeated them. Fisteen Hundred Turks were killed, and a Pacha of Three Tails, with a considerable Number of Officers, and above a Thousand Men, taken Prisoners. The Camp, with the Artillery, Standards, &c. fell into the Hands of the Conquerors, whose Loss amounted only to Sixty Men killed, and One Hundred wounded.

Stockholm, May 22.

On Monday last all the Senators who had not previously refigned, received a circular Letter from the King, by which they were difinisfied. Six of them were afterwards appointed Members of the new Council, which, according to the late Institution, is to transfact the fame Business the Senate'used to do, and to be divided into Two Departments, One of which is to be named the Court of Revision for judicial Affairs, and the other for Matters of interior Economy. The new Council, will consist of Six Nobles and Six Commoners in the first Department, and in the latter of Eight Nobles and Four Commoners.

Vienna, May 27.

The Emperor has conferred the Rank of Lieutenant Field-Marshal on the Major Generals Count de Harrach, Baron d'Alvinzi, Prince Christian de Waldeck, Baron de Levenehr, and Baron de Wallisch; and has appointed the Colonels Baron de Mayerscheim, Count d'Auersberg, and Count de Kollonitsch, to be Major-Generals.

Vienna, May 30.

His Imperial Majefty has had another Return of his Fever. He was, however, Yefterday Evening much better than he had been for Three or Four Days paft, and had begun to take the Bark, from which the most falutary Effects are expected.

The Emperor has appointed Count Erneft Kaunitz, eldeft Son of Prince Kaunitz, to be Grand Marshal, in the Room of the Count de Wrbna lately deceased.

The last Accounts from the Bannat state that the Grand Army, under the Command of Marshal Haddick, had quitted Opova, and was on the 24th at Weisskuchen, where are now the Head Quarters.

A confiderable Corps has been detached to Caranfebes, and a fufficient Force remains at Semiia. Troops are also stationed at Panczova, Kubin and Uipalanka.

Intelligence has been received that the Grand Vizir, with an Army of an Hundred Thoulaud Men, has left Ruschuck, and is advancing along the Banks of the Danube, towards Cladova, in Servia. Advice has been received from Moldavia, that

Advice has been received from Moldavia, that the Russians have abandoned their recent Acquisition at Gallacz, and have burnt that Town to the Ground.

Berlin, June 2.

The King of Prussia returned on the 29th ult. from the Encampment in the Neighbourhood of Magdeburgh, where his Majesty conferred the Order of the Black Eagle upon Lieutenant-General Schlief, fen and Lieutenant-General Kuobelsdorff, and gave the Order of Merit to all the Officers commanding Regiments, as a Mark of his entire Satisfaction; and Yetterday his Majesty set out for Pomerania and Prussia.
