

they had attempted to make into the Licca, in the Austrian Territory, and that, after this Defeat, the Austrians had taken a Redoubt, with Four Iron Cannons. In the Evening of the 28th Ult. the Turks retreated towards Vakup.

The last Accounts from Moldavia state, that the Prince of Saxe-Cobourg, with the Army under his Command, had reached Bakun; that the Russians were posted in the Environs of Gallacz; that a considerable Number of Turks were assembled near Fockschan, and that the Grand Vizir had arrived on the Banks of the Danube, opposite to Ismail.

An Imperial Ordinance was published on the 18th Instant, by which all the Concessions and Privileges granted or confirmed by the Emperor to the Province of Brabant, as well as the whole Contents of the *Joyeuse Entrée*, are declared to be revoked and annulled; and a Supreme Council is established at Malines, in Lieu of the Provincial Council of Brabant, which is abolished.
