Lyme, June 8.

His morning arrived here the *John*, and the *Elizabeth* of this place, in three dayss from *Moriaix*, and brought over feveral *Englifh* Merchants, who left that place, having now but little to do there.

Portfmouth, fune 9. On the 6th inflant arrived in Cowes Koad a Hamburgh Man of War of 28 Guns, called the St. Francis, Capt. Peter Nimman Commander, with a Merchantman called the Ann of Hamburg, of 18 Guns, Matthias Middleman Malter, bound for Portugal.

Deale, fune 9. This morning arrived in the Downs the William, the Conftant Merchant, and the Recovery, from Virginia; they bring not any News: as alfo the Theodore, the Europe, and the Batchelor, from the Straights. Three lhips more are now coming in, likewile, as is believed, from Virginia.

Vienna, June 5. The Emp ror will return hither from Laxemburg the 8th inflant, and in the mean time feveral Conferences are held there, for the taking the Refolutions neceffary, as well in relation to the Affairs of Hungary, as those which regard the War, in which his Imperial Majeffy is at prefent engaged. The Emperor has granted the Hungarians feveral Points they demanded, and especially that about choofing a Palatine, which will be done at the next Affembly of the States of that Kingdom The Marriage between the Archdutchels Anne, and the Prince of Neuburg, is certainly concluded, and will be confummated, when the Duke and Dutchels arrive. Two dayes fince arrived here an Envoy from the Elector of Brandenburgh, and hath had Audience of the Emperor, to whom he represented leveral matters relating to the present Corjuncture.

Copenhagen, June 11. Yesterday the King was on Board the Fleet. Admiral *Fuels* returned with his Majelly hither, to receive his lalt Orders. The Fleet defigned for the Baltick under his Command, confifts in 52 Sail, as well Men of War, as Fireships and Tenders, and have, as we are told, on Board them 12000 Mon, as well Scamen as Soldiers. The Squadron defigned Welward, and as some believe' to block up Gottenburg, confilts in 26 'ail, and have on Board 2600 M.u. They will fail fo foon as the wind ferves. From Norway we have Advice, That the Sieur Guldenlien hath posselicd himself of the Illand Hieflingen, and the Fort that was there, the Suedes had, they fay, 2000 M.n on the faid Ifland, who quitted if, but in their tetreat loft about 100 Men, the Danes took there fix pieces of Cannon, and at prefent attack the Fort of Bahus. The Forces pass daily over into Schonen, but we know not yet when the King will go over in perfon. We have another report, that the Suedes have made an Affault upon Christianstadt, and that they have been repulsed, which however we give no credit to.

Hamburgb, fune 14. We have already given you an account, that the Munster Troops, who were going to the affiltance of the King of Denmark, had paffed the Elbe, and were marching towards Kiel, from whence they would be carried over to Schonen; fince we are informed that 1800 Men, belonging to the Landtgrave of Helle, are marching the fame way, to overtake and join with them. It is faid that the Suedes, upon the approach of fome Brandenburgh and Lunenbargh Troops, have quitted Damgarten By a Veffel arrived in 11 or 12 dayes from Gottenburg, we have Advice, that the Danes, being 18000 ftrong, under the Command of General Dunkam, have bein ged the ftrong Forrels of Babus; and that Gottenburg was blocked up by four Danifb Men of War. The Depaties of the City of Dantzick, have obtained of the Elector of Brandenburg, the liberty of Dr. Strauch. We are told that the Suedifh Fleet is at Sea.

From the Imperial Camp near Hochberg, June 9. Several Regiments of Foot which we expected , having joined us yelterday at Rugel, we marched from thence to Emendingen, and are now encamped within half a League of the Enemy, who are very advantageoufly encamped on a Hill near Langendentzling: And our Camp reaches from the great way of Hockberg to the River Elz, the Guatus of the two Armies fland in fight of each other We have been joined here by the Troops who were possible.

Straburgh. fune to. The Imperial and French Armics are encamped to near each other, that it will be hard for them to part without fome Action. The Duke of Lorrain has fent the unneceffary Baggage, and the Women, which followed the Army, to Offenbourg, ideming refolved to make use of the first occafion, which may bring them to a Battel. The Boats deligned for the making a Bridge over the Rhine at Rheinaw, are fent down hither.

Rheinaw, arc fent down hither. Mentz, fune 12. The three Regiments of the Elector of Saxony continue encamped on the Saour, in the Baillage of Wafferbillich; and the Imperial Regiment of the Count d'Arch, has received a command to remain at Trier, till farther Order. It is faid here, that the Mareschal de Schomberg will advance with the Troops under his Command to the Moselle.

From the Marefebal de Crequi's Camp at Langendentzlingen, *June* 13, The Imperial Army is encamped within half a League of us, and our Parties have frequent skirmifles. They were all the laft night drawn up in Battalia; we know not what their defign is, but the Prifoners we take tell us, that they want Forage, which they are forced to go four miles to feek. We have defeated a Convoy, which was going to them from Straburgb.

Cologne, June 14. The Bilhop of Paderborne, according to what was agreed here by the Ministers of the Allies, has fent his Quota of Troops, and on Saturday last they lodged in the Territory Belonging to the Abby of Essen, in order to their passing the Rhine at Koerort The other Princes will likewife fend their Quota's, for the forming an Army to fecure their Territories feitnate between the Rhine and the Meuse. The Mareschal de Schomberg has summoned moned the States of *Juliers* to pay the Arrears of their Contributions within a time limited, and with much difficulty they have got eight dayes more added to the term. We are here in expediation of hearing of a Battel between the two Armis in Bri/gow, for we have icen Letters from fome of the principal Officers of the Imperial Army dated the roth inflant, which fay, That the Armies were fo polled, that it would be hard for either to avoid an Engagement, in cafe the other prefs it; and add, that the Duke of Lorrain was very much inclined to come to a Battel, and therefore had fint away all his unneceffary Baggage, and had commanded feveral Regiments which were polled, to fecure the paffages of the Black Foreff to join his Army, as they had accordingly done.

cordingly done. Hague, Fune 17. On Tuesday the Members of the States of Holland came to Town, and the next day were Affembl.d, his Highness the Prince of Urange was prefent at their debates, and the refolutions that were taken on the matters before them. The fame day was read in the Affembly of the States General, a Letter from the Emperor to this State. The Marquis de Grana is expected here in a day or two from Bruffels. From Nimeguen we have an Account, that the Heer Odyke, one of the Ambaffadors and Pleilipo1 tentiaries of this State, was arrived there, and that the Sieur Beverning was fomewhat indifposed. From Ruremond they write, that the Mareschal de Schom berg continued encamped near Aix la Chapelle, that the Sieur Chauvet, who commands the Lunenburgh Troops, had drawn them together, and had ient to the Sieur Spaen, General of the Troops of the Elector of Brandenburgh, to defire he would join with him; that at first a difficulty had arison about the chief Command, between Lieutenant-General Spaen, and LieutenantGeneral Chauvet, which had been at last removed, by agreeing that they fhould command by turns; however the Brandenburg Troops did not yet move and for that reafon the Sieur Chauver could not profecute his defigns. We have Letters from Strafburg of the 11th, which fay, That feveral Porcs that were come in there, pretended to have heard great fhooting, upon which they were ready to conclude that the Armies, which they had before underflood to be very near each other, were engaged; but we have Letters of the fame date from other places thereabouts, which make not any mention thereof.

Bruffels, Fune 17. The French Army continues encamped between Lieuwe St. Pierre and Bigard, but we are informed, that it will in a day or two remove from thence, and that a Camp is marked out between Hall and Toubife. The Duke of Luxemburg, after having lent another detachment of five Regiments of Horfe, and as many of Foot, towards Germany, is, by the Kings Command, gone for Paris, leaving the Command of the Army to the Mareschal d'Humieres. From Liege we have an Account, That the Mareschal de Schomberg continues encamped in the Neighborhood of Aix la Chapelle, with an Army of between 12 and 14000 Men. The two Captains, and the Official of the Intendant at Luxemburg, who had formed a defign to betray that place to the Enemy, have been executed there. There are Letters from the Duke of Lorrain, in which he fayes, that he was incamped almost in fight of the Every ; that he hoped not to part with them, without fome Action ; and that in effect, confidering how they were posted , the Erench could not retire without exposing their Rear.

The Sieur *Chauvet*, General of the *Lunenburg* Troops, has not been able to advance against the Mareschal *de Schomberg*, for that the *Brandenburgs* made difficulty to join with him.

Paris, June 18. In our last we informed you hat we had an Account, That the Sieur de Quefne had burnt a Spanish thip in the Port of Barcelona; which is not only confirmed, but the faid thip prove a Man of War of 60 Guns, and 300 Men, as w deritand by the Letters we have from the Sieur u Luefne himfelf, the Particulars are : That Cruff g on the Coaft of Catalonia, he had Advice, that feve-ral Spanish Men of War lay in the Road of Barcelona, upon which the Sieur du Luefne took his courfe thither, but found there onely one Man of War mounted with 60 Cannon, and 300 Men, at Anchor about a Piffol flot from the Point of the Mole in five fathom water. The Si ur de Luefne not thinking it neceffary to employ his whol Squadron, commanded three Men of War and a Firelhip to enter into the Road, which they did, and came to an Anchor very near the Spanish Man of War, which they plyed very warmly with their Cannon, while the File "rip laid him on Board ; the Spaniards made a good d fence first with their Cannon, and then endeavouring to difingage themselves of the Fireship, which however th y could not do, but their fhip taking file, was burnt. Some of the Seamen and Soldiers, who endeavored to fave their lives by fwimming, were taken up by our Chaloups. We loft in this Action about 20 Men. The Chevalier de Hailly had his Arm taken off, of which he dyed fome hours after, and the Sieur de Montreuil was wounded in the Arm. From Catalonia we have Advice, that the Mareschal de Navailles was marched with the Army into Lampourdam, to put them into quarters of refreshment. In Germany the Armies are to near, that we expect every hour to hear of a Battel.

Whiteball, fune 10. The laft week arrived here Sir Palmes Fairborne, Lieutenant-Governor of His Majeffies (ity and Garilo) of Tangier, having had His Majeffies leave to repair hither for fome time, and was most Gracioufly received by His Majeffy, and with Marks of the great Satisfaction His Majeffy is pleafed to have in his Services and Conduct in that Government.
