**T**HEIR Majesties and Their Royal Highnesses the Princess Royal, Princess Augusta and Princess Elizabeth, arrived at Gloucester-House, in perfect Health, at a little after Four o'Clock Yesterday Afternoon. The Cannon at Portland Castle were soon after fired, which were answered by His Majesty's Ships in the Roads, and by a Royal Salute from the Battery on Shore; and in the Evening the whole Town was very splendidly illuminated.

This Day the Mayor and Corporation waited on Their Majesties with the following Address, which was received very graciously.

**WE**, the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen, Bailiffs, Burgesses and Commonalty of your Majesty's Borough and Town of Weymouth and Melcombe Regis, beg Leave to congratulate your Majesty on your safe Arrival at this Place, and to acknowledge how sensible we are of the high Honor done to us by your Majesty's Visit.

It is our anxious Hope that we shall not soon be deprived of that heart-felt Joy which the Presence of our beloved Sovereign every where diffuses. The Sight of their Monarch is always grateful to a loyal People, but it is never more so than when, laying aside the awful Splendor of a Throne, he condescends to appear amongst them, clothed in the more pleasing, because better known, Characters of domestic Life.

SIRE,

The Magistrates of this Borough and Town will exert their utmost Endeavours to preserve Peace and good Order within their Jurisdiction, because they know they shall thereby best recommend themselves to your Majesty's Notice.

Deign, Sir, to accept the Gratitude of this Corporation, which, in common with the Rest of your Majesty's Subjects, has felt the Blessings of a mild and constitutional Administration of the Government, in the extended Commerce and increasing Riches of the Nation.

To your Majesty, as eminently distinguished for every Virtue that can give Dignity to your Sex, our Reverence is particularly due. Whilst the arduous Duties of the Mother and the Wife shall be had in Honour amongst Mankind, the Merits of our Queen will never be forgotten.

May your Majesties, mutually happy in each other, long live to enjoy the Love and Admiration of your People, and may they ever be mindful that the Splendor of Royalty is adorned by the Virtues of private Life.
