WHEREAS the Select Committee appointed to try and determine the Merits of the Petition of Sir Samuel Hood, Baronet, Lord Hood in the Kingdom of Ireland; and also the Petition of several Inhabitants, Householders of the City and Liberty of Westminster, paying Scot and Lot, whose Names are thereunto subscribed, being Electors of Members to represent the said City and Liberty in Parliament, on Behalf of themselves and many other Electors of the said City and Liberty, severally complaining of an undue Election and Return for the said City and Liberty, have this Day reported to the House of Commons, "That it appeared to the said Select Committee, that the Merits of the Petitions did in Part depend upon the Right of Election, the Parties were therefore required to deliver in Statements in Writing of the Right of Election for which they respectively contended; that in consequence thereof the Petitioner Lord Hood delivered in a Statement as follows: "The Petitioner Lord Hood states, that the Right of Election for the City and Liberty of Westminster is in the Inhabitants, Householders paying Scot and Lot, within the united Parishes of Saint Margaret and Saint John, and the several Parishes of Saint Paul Covent-Garden, Saint Ann, Saint James, Saint George Hanover-Square, in the Liberty of Saint Martin-le-Grand in the County of Middlesex, and in so much of the Parishes of Saint Martin in the Fields, Saint Clement Danes, and Saint Mary-le-Strand, as are not within any of the Four Wards of the Liberty of the Duchy of Lancaster, called the Temple-Bar Ward, the Royal Ward, the Middle Ward, and Precinct of the Savoy." That the Electors Petitioners delivered in a Statement as follows: "The Electors Petitioners state, that the Right of Election for the City and Liberty of Westminster is in the Inhabitants, Householders paying Scot and Lot, within the united Parishes of Saint Margaret and Saint John, and the several Parishes of Saint Paul Covent-Garden, Saint Ann, Saint James, Saint George Hanover-Square, in the Liberty of Saint Martin-le-Grand in the County of Middlesex, and in so much of the Parishes of Saint Martin in the Fields, Saint Clement Danes, and Saint Mary-le-Strand, as are not within any of the Four Wards of the Liberty of the Duchy of Lancaster, called the Temple-Bar Ward, the Royal Ward, the Middle Ward, and Precinct of the Savoy." That the Sitting Member Lord John Townshend delivered in a Statement as follows: "The Right of Election is in the Inhabitants, Householders of the Parishes of Saint Margaret and Saint John, Saint George Hanover-Square, Saint James Westminster, Saint Martin in the Fields, Saint Clement Danes, Saint Mary-le-Strand, Saint Mary-le-Savoy, Saint Paul Covent-Garden, Saint Ann Soho, and the District of Saint Martin-le-Grand." That upon the Statements delivered in by the Petitioners the said Select Committee have determined, "That the Right of Election for the City and Liberty of Westminster is in the Inhabitants, Householders paying Scot and Lot, within the United Parishes of Saint Margaret and Saint John, and the several Parishes of Saint Paul Covent Garden, Saint Ann, Saint James, Saint George Hanover-Square, in the Liberty of Saint Martin-le-Grand in the County of Middlesex, and in so much of the Parishes of Saint Martin in the Fields, Saint Clement Danes, and Saint Mary-le-Strand, as are not within any of the Four Wards of the Liberty of the Duchy of Lancaster." "the Statement delivered in by the Sitting Member the Committee have determined, "That the Right of Election, as set forth in the said Statement, is not the Right of Election for the said City and Liberty of Westminster."

Dublin Castle, June 30.

This Day the Right Honourable the Lord Chancellor, and the Right Honourable John Foster, Speaker of the House of Commons, were sworn in Council Lords Justices of this Kingdom in the Absence of the Lord Lieutenant.

Madrid, June 18.

An Edict was published here the Day before Yesterday for regulating the Ceremony of his Catholick Majesty's Coronation, which is fixed for the 21st of September next.

Vienna, June 24.

The Emperor's Health has been much better since his Residence at Laxembourg. His Imperial Majesty passed Three or Four Days without Fever, and has recovered his Strength so far as to be able to take the Air for the greatest Part of the Day in the Gardens of that Palace. On Sunday and Monday last however his Majesty had a Return of his Fever, though not to any considerable Degree.

Intelligence has been received from Sciaevonia, that General Mitrowsky, with the Corps under his Command, had passed the Save, for the Purpose of seconding the Operations of Marshal Laudohn against Gradisca.

The last Accounts from Transylvania state, that the Prince of Hohenlohe, after having been joined by a Corps of about 6000 Men, from the Grand Army in the Bannat, had left Hermanstadt, and had advanced towards the Frontier of Moldavia, from whence he had detached a Reinforcement to the Prince of Saxe-Cobourg at Bakou.

Paris, July 2.

The National Assembly met on Tuesday last, according to the Adjournment from last Saturday, and proceeded to verify the Returns of all the Members in common, when the Majority of the Nobility protested against any Resolutions of the Assembly till they receive further Instructions from their Constituents.
