**T**HE King has been pleased to grant to Sir James Erskine, Bart. and his Issue, His Royal Licence and Authority to assume and bear the Name of St. Clair, in Pursuance of a Deed of Settlement made by the late General James St. Clair, deceased; and also to order that this His Majesty's Concession and Declaration be registered in His College of Arms.

The King has been pleased to grant to William Harrison, of Ulverstone, in the County Palatine of Lancaster, Gentleman, and his Issue by his now Wife Isabel, only Daughter and Heiress apparent of Thomas North, of Docker, in the Parish of Whittington, in the same County, Gentleman, His Royal Licence and Authority to assume and take the Surname of North, in Compliance with the Request of the said Thomas North; and also to order that this His Majesty's Concession and Declaration be registered in His College of Arms.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the People of the Hebrew Nation, resident in the Island of Barbadoes.

*Most Gracious Sovereign,*

**P**artaking of the general Joy, universally diffused among all Ranks and Denominations of your Majesty's loyal Subjects throughout the extensive Dominions of the British Empire, on your Majesty's happy Recovery from your late dangerous and alarming Malady, we, your Majesty's ever dutiful and loyal Subjects of the Hebrew Nation inhabiting this Colony, humbly beg Leave to approach the Throne with this our most humble Address of Congratulation on the Re-establishment of your Majesty's Health.

Permit us, Great Sir, to say, that though, from the painful Distance we are settled from the Royal Presence, we may be behindhand with our Fellow-Subjects, more happily situated nearer your Sacred Person, in our Congratulations to your Majesty on this Occasion, yet that the Joy we feel on the happy Event is equal to their's, and our Tribute of Congratulation not less sincere.

The many Blessings derived to us through the whole Course of your Majesty's Reign, and the Protection we have always experienced in this distant Spot from your Majesty's Representatives here, demand the warmest Returns of Gratitude, and bind

us by every Tie invariably to pursue that Spirit of Loyalty and Affection to the King, and Attachment to the Constitution, which has ever been the distinguishing Characteristic of our Nation.

We shall not presume further than to offer up our Prayers to Heaven for your Majesty's Health, Glory, and Felicity; that the singular Blessings of your Reign may be very long continued to us; and that the Sceptre of these Kingdoms may never depart from the Descendants of your Illustrious and Royal House.

The Emperor's Fever still continues, and his Majesty is at present much indisposed.

On the 20th Instant the Siege of Gradiſca commenced by a general Bombardment; Marshal Laudohn having advanced with his Army to the Vicinity of that Place to cover the Siege. Accounts are received that the Pacha of Trauruk was collecting a considerable Body of Turks, probably with the Intention of risking an Action, with a View to preserve Gradiſca.

According to the last Advices from Moldavia, the Grand Vizir still remained in his Camp on the Banks of the Danube, nearly opposite to Iſmail.

On Friday last the States General being assembled, the Duke d'Orléans was chosen President of that Assembly; but his Highness declining that Office; the Archbishop of Vienne was elected almost unanimously, and has accepted that important Appointment.

His Majesty, for the better apprehending and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the Assault and Robbery abovementioned, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them (except the Person who first wounded the said George Taylor in the Coach as aforesaid) who shall discover his Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

**WHEREAS** divers Persons, to whom Money has been issued for Public Services, have neglected to deliver into this Office the Vouchers for the Expediture thereof, together with an Account Current, in the Manner, and within the Time prescribed by the Act for better examining and Auditing the Public Accounts of this Kingdom, the Commissioners for Auditing the Public Accounts have directed that Copies of the following Sections of the said Act be inserted in the London Gazette, in order that all Persons to whom Public Money has been, or shall be, so issued, may be informed of the Consequences of such Neglect.

SECTION XVII. And whereas great Losses and Inconveniences have arisen to the Public, by Sub-Accountants not having been put in Charge till a long Time has elapsed after the Monies were issued

to them, be it enacted, That the Paymaster-General of His Majesty's Forces, the Treasurer of the Navy, the Treasurer of the Ordnance, and every other Public Officer who shall hereafter pay into the Hands of any Person or Persons whomsoever, Money for Public Services, by Way of Imprest or on Account, shall, within Thirty Days of the 31st Day of December, One thousand seven hundred and eighty-five, and within Thirty Days of the 31st Day of December, in every future Year, transmit an Account of all Sums of Money issued or paid by him or them to any Person or Persons, for the Public Service, within the preceding Year, to the Commissioners to be appointed under the Authority of this Act; who shall, and they are hereby required forthwith to transmit Duplicates of the same to His Majesty's Remembrancer in the Court of Exchequer, who shall immediately, on Receipt of such Accounts, put the several Sums so issued in Charge against the Parties, in like Manner as is now practised with respect to Persons who receive Money by Way of Imprest, and on Account, at the Receipt of His Majesty's Exchequer.

SECTION XVIII. Provided always, and be it enacted, That no Accountant shall be allowed in his Account any Sum which he shall issue or pay over to any Sub-Accountants, unless he shall have transmitted to the said Commissioners regular Accounts thereof, in the Manner and within the Times abovementioned; unless Proof shall be produced, to the Satisfaction of the Lord High Treasurer, or the Commissioners of the Treasury, that any Failure of transmitting the same did not happen from the wilful Neglect of the Person issuing or paying over the Money as aforesaid.

SECTION XX. And be it further enacted and declared, That every Sub-Accountant to whom Money shall hereafter be issued for Public Services, in case the Money so issued shall have been for Services to be performed in Great Britain, shall deliver into the Office of the Commissioners to be appointed by virtue of this Act, the Vouchers for the Expenditure thereof, together with an Account Current, within Three Months of the End of each Year from the Commencement of his Account, unless it has been usual for such Account to be made up to any fixed Period in the Year; in which Case they shall be delivered within Three Months of the usual annual Time of the Determination of each Account respectively; and in case such Monies shall have been issued for Services to be performed in any Part of Europe out of this Kingdom, then the Vouchers shall be delivered within Four Months of the Expiration of each Year's Accounts; if in the West Indies, the Continent of America, or in Africa, within Six Months after the Expiration of each Year's Accounts; and if in the East Indies, within Twelve Months after the Expiration of each Year's Accounts; unless it shall in each and every Case be made appear to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of the Treasury, that the Failure of transmitting the same, within the Periods beforementioned, was unavoidable; in which Case such further Delay may be granted by Warrant under the Hands of the Commissioners of the Treasury, or any Three of them, as they shall judge reasonable; and in such Cases the Vouchers shall be delivered at the Expiration of the Term of Delay so granted, on Pain, upon Failure in any of the abovementioned Cases, of paying such Fine to His Majesty as the Court of Exchequer, on Application made to them, shall think fit to set

and impose; which Fine the said Court is hereby authorized and empowered to set and impose accordingly.

SECTION XXII. Provided always, and be it enacted, that when any Sub-Accountant or Sub-Accountants shall transmit to the Commissioners, to be appointed under the Authority of this Act, a sufficient and satisfactory Discharge from the Principal Officers of the Ordnance, the Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy, the Commissioners for Victualling His Majesty's Navy, or the Commissioners of Sick and Hurt, for any Monies he or they shall have received in the said Departments severally, the said Commissioners shall transmit a Duplicate of the same to His Majesty's Remembrancer in the Court of Exchequer, who shall forthwith strike out the Name or Names of such Sub-Accountant or Sub-Accountants from the Imprest Roll; and such Sub-Accountant or Sub-Accountants shall from thenceforth be discharged from any other or further Account for the same.
