Whitehall, July 11.

THE King has been pleased to grant to Sir James Erskine, Bart. and his Issue, His Royal Licence and Authority to assume and bear the Name of St. Clair, in Pursuance of a Deed of Settlement made by the late General James St. Clair, deceased; and also to order that this His Majesty's Concession and Declaration be registered in His College of Arms.

The King has been pleased to grant to William Harrison, of Ulverstone, in the County Palatine of Lancaster, Gentleman, and his Issue by his now Wife Isabel, only Daughter and Heiress apparent of Thomas North, of Docker, in the Parish of Whittington, in the same County, Gentleman, His Royal Licence and Authority to assume and take the Surname of North, in Compliance with the Request of the said Thomas North; and also to order that this His Majesty's Concession and Declaration be registered in His College of Arms.

The following Address having been delivered to the Right Honourable William Wyndham Grenville, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, has been by him presented to the King: Which Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the People of the Hebrew Nation, resident in the Island of Barbadoes.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

Partaking of the general Joy, universally diffused among all Ranks and Denominations of your Majesty's loyal Subjects throughout the extensive Dominions of the British Empire, on your Majesty's happy Recovery from your late dangerous and alarming Malady, we, your Majesty's ever dutiful and loyal Subjects of the Hebrew Nation inhabiting this Colony, humbly beg Leave to approach the Throne with this our most humble Address of Congratulation on the Re-establishment of your Majesty's Health.

Permit us, Great Sir, to say, that though, from the painful Distance we are settled from the Royal Presence, we may be behindhand with our Fellow-Subjects, more happily situated nearer your Sacred Person, in our Congratulations to your Majesty on this Occasion, yet that the Joy we feel on the happy Event is equal to their's, and our Tribute of Congratulation not less sincere.

The many Blessings derived to us through the whole Course of your Majesty's Reign, and the Protection we have always experienced in this distant Spot from your Majesty's Representatives here, demand the warmest Returns of Gratitude, and bind

us by every Tie invariably to pursue that Spirit of Loyalty and Affection to the King, and Attachment to the Constitution, which has ever been the distinguishing Characteristic of our Nation.

We shall not presume further than to offer up our Prayers to Heaven for your Majesty's Health, Glory, and Felicity; that the singular Blessings of your Reign may be very long continued to us; and that the Sceptre of these Kingdoms may never depart from the Descendants of your Illustrious and Royal House.

Vienna, June 27.

The Emperor's Fever still continues, and his Majesty is at present much indisposed.

On the 20th Instant the Siege of Gradiſca commenced by a general Bombardment; Marshal Laudohn having advanced with his Army to the Vicinity of that Place to cover the Siege. Accounts are received that the Pacha of Trauruk was collecting a considerable Body of Turks, probably with the Intention of risking an Action, with a View to preserve Gradiſca.

According to the last Advices from Moldavia, the Grand Vizir still remained in his Camp on the Banks of the Danube, nearly opposite to Iſmail.

Paris, July 6.

On Friday last the States General being assembled, the Duke d'Orléans was chosen President of that Assembly; but his Highness declining that Office; the Archbishop of Vienne was elected almost unanimously, and has accepted that important Appointment.
