

panied only by *Monsieur*, and the Count d'Artois, and addressed the States in a Speech, in which his Majesty exhorted them to provide the Means of restoring Order and Tranquillity, and to assist him in securing the Welfare of the State; and his Majesty acquainted them that, relying on the Affection and Fidelity of his Subjects, he had ordered the Troops to retire to a certain Distance from Paris and Versailles.

This Speech was received with universal Applause, and his Majesty returned to his Apartments, attended by all the Deputies of the Nation, amidst the Acclamations of an innumerable Concourse of People. The National Assembly immediately sent a Deputation to the General Assembly of the Electors at the Hotel de Ville, to acquaint them with the above-mentioned Proceedings.

The Army, in Pursuance of the King's Orders, retired to Séve early on Wednesday Morning, leaving their Camp Equipage behind them.

The Marquis de la Fayette has been appointed Commander in Chief of the Paris Militia, and M. Bailly Prévôt de Marchands.

This Afternoon, at about Half an Hour after Two o'Clock, his Majesty entered Paris in a Coach drawn by Eight Horses, attended by the Duc de Villeroy, Captain of the Life Guards, the Duc de Villequier, First Gentleman of the Bedchamber, the Marshal de Beauvau, the Count D'Estaing, and Two Equerries, followed by another Coach, in which were Four other Attendants, and escorted only by the City Militia, the Commandant of which rode a little before the King's Coach, accompanied by several of the principal Tradesmen of Paris. The whole Way from the Entrance at the Barrier at Passy to the Hotel de Ville was lined on each Side with armed Citizens, and the most perfect Tranquillity was observed. After his Majesty had entered the Hotel de Ville, he declared that he appeared there to gratify the Wishes of the Citizens of Paris, and to assure them of his Readiness to do every Thing in his Power to quiet their Minds, and restore Tranquillity to the City. On his Majesty's Return he received every Testimony of Loyalty and Affection from a most numerous and orderly Populace; and it is computed that this Day there were not less than 150,000 Men bearing Arms in Paris.

His Majesty has dismissed all his new confidential Servants, excepting M. de la Galisiere, and has sent to recall M. Necker, who is expected to arrive To-morrow, if he is not already at Versailles.

THE Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury have given Directions for paying off Exchequer Bills issued pursuant to an Act of Parliament passed in the Twenty-seventh Year of His present Majesty's Reign, for raising a further Sum of Money by Loans or Exchequer Bills, for the Service of the Year 1788, and charged on the Aids of the present Year, and that the Principal and Interest on such Bills shall be paid at the Exchequer Bill Office in St. Margaret's-street, between the two Palace-Yards, Westminster, on Thursday the 6th Day of August next; and Attendance will be given on Thursday next, the 23d instant, and every succeeding Day, until the 3d Day of August next inclusive, from Ten o'Clock in the Morning till One in the Afternoon (Sundays and Holidays excepted) for that Purpose: And for the greater Dispatch, the Bearer of the said Bills are desired to bring Lists thereof, containing the Numbers, Times of Commencement of Interest, with the Principal Sum and Interest due on such Bills, to be computed at Two Pence Halfpenny by the Day on every Hundred Pounds, from the Time of Commencement to the said 6th Day of August, 1789; on which Day the Interest on the said Exchequer Bills will cease: And they are desired to write their Names and Places of Abode on such Lists, and endorse their Names on the Backs of the said Bills: And such Persons as are desirous of

having new Exchequer Bills of the present Year in Part of Payment, upon mentioning the same at the Foot of their Lists delivered on or before Monday the 3d Day of August, 1789, will be accommodated with new Bills of 100l. each, carrying an Interest of Two-pence Halfpenny a Day to the Amount of the Principal of the Bills by them delivered up; which new Bills will bear Date the said 6th of August, 1789, and will be delivered on the 13th of August next, and on the following Days, at the said Office.
