When the melancholy Tidings of your Majesty's
Indisposition reached this distant Part of your Dominions, your loyal Subjects were penetrated with every sympathetick and heartselt Sensation of Grief, Anguish and Sorrow, and their Prayers in every Church and Place of Worship were cordially and fervently offered up to the Supreme and Merciful Ruler of the Universe, that your Majesty's Health might be speedily and happily reinstated.

That the Supplications of Millions in different Kingdoms have been heard at the Throne of Mercy, we now unite in Thanks with every grateful Praife, and concur in rejoicing with all the Inhabitants of this Island, that the wished-sor Restoration has been most graciously and effectually accomplished.

And that the Almighty Disposer of all Events may be pleased to grant to your Majesty a long and uninterrupted Series of Health and every other Felicity, is, and will always be, the ardent Prayers of your Majesty's most dutiful, loyal and faithful Subjects and Servants.

Animated not less by a sincere Love of the Constitution than the heartfelt Regard due to your Majesty's Person, we return our Thanks to Almighty God for the Restoration of that Health with which the Happiness of your Subjects, how-ever remote or distant from your Throne, is so intimately connected.

That your Majesty may enjoy perfect Health to fee many and happy Anniversaries of this your Natal Day, and long to reign over a grateful and affectionate People, is our earnest Prayer.
