The humble Address of the Lieutenant-Governor, Officers Civil and Military, Ministers and Inhabitants of the Island of Cape-Breton and its Dependencies.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

UNITING in one Mind, and in one Sentiment, we humbly beg Leave to approach your Majesty's most Sacred Person, to offer our joyful Congratulations, and pour out the warmest Effusions of our grateful Hearts to the Almighty God, for your Majesty's Restoration to Health, and to the wonted lenient and just Exercise of the Government and Protection of a loyal and affectionate People.

The Influence of this happy Event failed not to reach even this abstracted and immatured Settlement, and pervades our Hearts with Sentiments of Loyalty and Attachment, not inferior to what is expressed and felt in the most refined Parts of your Majesty's Dominions.

While we testify our Gratitude and Thankfulness to the Divine Being for your Majesty's Recovery, we fervently implore and supplicate that your Majesty's Health and Life may long be preserved Blessings of inestimable Value to every Part of your Majesty's wide and extensive Empire.

London, November 10.

On Sunday last William Pickett, Esq; Lord Mayor Elect for the Year ensuing, was sworn at Guildhall, when the Chair and other Ensigns of Mayoralty were surrendered to him in the accustomed Manner.

Yesterday the new Lord Mayor, accompanied by the late Lord Mayor, many of the Aldermen, and Sheriffs, in their Scarlet Gowns, went in their Coaches to the Water-side, the Sword and Mace being carried before them, and the City Officers attending; and from thence proceeded in their Barges, adorned with Streamers and Pendants, to Westminster; and having walked round the Hall, and solemnly saluted all the Courts, they went to the Exchequer Bar, and the Lord Mayor did there take the Oaths appointed; and, having recorded Warrants of Attorney in the proper Courts, returned by Water to Black Friars, and from thence in Coaches, with the usual Solemnity, to Guildhall, where a magnificent Entertainment was provided; at which were present the Foreign Ministers, the Great Officers of State, divers of the Nobility, Lords of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, the Judges, and many other Persons of Quality and Distinction.

Dublin-Castle, November 5.

Yesterday being the Anniversary of the Birth of the late King William the Third, of glorious Memory, in the Morning the Flag was displayed on Bedford Tower; at Noon there was a splendid Appearance of the Nobility and other Persons of Distinction at the Castle to compliment their Excellencies the Lords Justices; after which their Excellencies, attended by the Nobility and Gentry, and escorted by a Squadron of Horse, went in Procession round the Statue of King William. On their Excellencies Return to the Castle the Great Guns at the Salute Battery in His Majesty's Park the Phoenix were fired Three Rounds, and answered by Vollies from the Regiments in Garrison, which were drawn up in College Green; and at Night there were Bonfires, Illuminations, and other Demonstrations of Joy.
