Gentleman, who dved fuddenly in a Paffage-Boat, between Culemberg and Vianne ; the Stares, as well as the Prince of Orange, have fent to condole with him upon this occasion ; he, in his affliction, is retired to his own Effate, and Count Naffaw has taken upon him the Command of the Army. Yesterday 3 or 4000 French Horfe came very near this City, between Anderlech and Laken, to forage, our Cavalry went out to skirmish with them, but some of the French Officers rode up, and declared to them, that they had Orders to forbear all Acts of Hostility, that they came to take th ir leaves of them, for that they should decamp in a day of two. Our Letters from Ruremond, which cam yesterday, told us, that Lieutenant General Chauvet, who commands the Lunenburg Troops, had defeated Marcichal Schomberg's Rearguard, and taken fome of his Baggage ; that on the other fide, 300 of the Confederates Horse had been cut in pieces by the French, and that the two Armies were very near: But our Letters from Aix la Chapelle of the 25th, fay, there had not paffed any Action between them; that Marelchal Schomberg was encamped behind Borchel Abby, near Aix, on the fide towards Limburg; and that the Confederate Troops encamped the 25th at Heydam, on the other fide of Aix; that Parties from both Armies came daily into the Town to buy Provisions ; that the French were ftrongest in Foot, and the Confederates in Horse, in which the former had the advantage, being in a Countrey which is altogether inclosed. This day the Prince de Vaudemont, accompanied with Lieutenant-General Agurto, and other General Officers, went to the French Camp to visit the Duke of Luxemburg, who received them with great respect, shewed them his Army, and told them, that he had Orders to decamp in a day or two, and to put his Troops into feveral Garifons, except a detachment, which is to be fent to

Mareschal Schömberg. Ditto, July 1. While we were in expectation to hear that the Peace was figned at Nimeguen, at leaft between Spain, France, and Holland, and that in confequence thereof, the Armies would retire from the Spanish Territories, we receive very unexpected news from Nimeguen, as well as from the Hague, of a new and great difficulty arifen in that work, and that the Dutch Ambaffadors had by Orders from the States, absolutely refused to fign the Peace, till that was removed; in the mean time the month allowed by the Most Christian King to the States, to have their positive refolution in, being expired, we must expect that the French will renew the Hoftilities, and for this reafon his Excellency has fent Orders to flop the march of the Ofnabrug Troops, who having received part of the monies due to them, were marching towards the Meuse, to join with the other Confederate Troops; they are now coming back to their old quarters at Duffle, and the Dutch Troops, who were going home, are commanded to continue in these Parts.

Hague, July 1. The 27th paft, the States General, upon Letters they received from Nimeguen, were alfembled till one in the morning; the States of Holland had likewife long confultations on the fame Subject, till the 28th at noon, when they feparated, and the Deputies went home to confult their Principals, at leaft fome of them; they returned the 29 in the evening, and the 30 the States of Holland met again, and were together from eight in the morning, till one afternoon, his Highnefs being moft of that time prefent. Yefterday they were again affembled, as well as this day, and, it feems, had long debates, fo that all conclude the Affair before them is of great importance. Expresses have been fent to England. and to Nimeguen, with Orders to our Ministers there; and we are told that the States have refolved not to conclude the Peace, as was intended, till the difficulty which is at prefent arifen about the quitting the Towns in Flanders by the French is removed, fo that the hopes we had of Peace begin to leffen. In the mean time it is faid, that the Elector of Brandenburg has acquainted the States, that he will agree to the Ceffation of Arms as offered by France. We have nothing new from Germany, the Armies continued in the fame Posts, we gave you an account of in our last, and it was believed the Ceflation would likewife take place with them. The onely Son of Count Waldeck is dead fuddenly, to the great Affliction of that Family.

Paris, fuly 2. The King has, as we are informed, fent Orders to the Duke of Luxemburg, to remove with the Army out of the Neighborhood of Bruffels, after having fent a detachment of his Troops to join the Marefchal de Schomberg, who is encamped with his Body of men near Aix la Chapelle. According to the Advices we receive from Nimeguen, an Accident has hapned there, which may occafion a change in Affairs, for it is faid for certain, that the Dutch Ambalfadorshave declared they cannot fign the Peace, till the matter in diffute be adjulted. In Brifgow the Armies continue very clofely to obferve each others motions; the Imperialifts decamped the 24 inflamt from Bucken, and marched towards the Valley of Walkirke.
