Lisbon, November 7.

The Infant Don Pedro arrived here from Spain last Thursday. DESCRIPTION of the FORGED NOTES.

The Engraving in general is not so well executed, nor the Letters so clean and regular as in the genuine Note.

The Cups in the Shield at the Bottom of the Device are considerably smaller than in the real Note.

The Roman Letter at the N<sup>o</sup> appears to be inserted with a Printing Type, and is large and coarse, nor has any Resemblance to the Letter in the real Note.

The Engraver's Name Kirkwood is printed Kirkwoob.

The Subscriptions are so badly imitated, that the Imposition is observable on a very slight Inspection. But besides other Differences, which are unnecessary to mention, the Forgery is on common Paper, so that by holding it up to the Light, it may at once be detected by its wanting the Water Mark of
