P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS it hath been represented to His Majesty at this Board, that, by reason of the defective Execution of the Law respecting the Exportation and Importation of Corn and Grain, the Prices thereof cannot be properly ascertained for regulating and governing the Exportation and Importation thereof, in many Parts of Great Britain. And whereas it is expedient that a sufficient Supply of Wheat, Rye, Barley and Oats, and Flour or Meal made thereof, should be secured and retained within this Kingdom: And whereas there is reason to believe that, from the Deficiencies of the Crops in several Foreign Parts, very extensive Commissions have been received, and may hereafter be received, for purchasing in Great Britain Wheat, Rye, Barley and Oats, or Flour or Meal made thereof, for the Supply of such Foreign Parts. And whereas the Parliament standing prorogued to the 21st Day of January, 1790, His Majesty has not an Opportunity of speedily taking the Advice of His Parliament: In order therefore to fulfill the Intention of the Legislature, by securing to His faithful Subjects a sufficient Supply of Wheat, Rye, Barley, Beans and Oats, and Flour and Meal made thereof, His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth order, and it is hereby ordered, that no Person or Persons whatever shall, from and after the Publication of this Order in the London Gazette, until further Order, directly or indirectly export, transport, carry or convey, or cause or procure to be exported, transported, carried or conveyed, out of or from any Port or Place in Great Britain, or load or lay on board, or cause or procure to be loaded or laid on board, of any Ship, Vessel or Boat, in order to be exported or carried out of any Port or Place in Great Britain, any Wheat, Wheat-Flour,

Rye, Rye-Meal, Barley, Barley-Meal, Malt, Bread, Biscuit, Oats, Oat-Meal and Beans: His Majesty hath, nevertheless, thought fit to order, and doth hereby order, that nothing herein contained shall extend to prohibit any Person or Persons to ship or put on board any of the Articles aforesaid, to be carried Coastwise, that is to say, from any Port, Creek, Member or Part of the Kingdom of Great Britain, to any other Port, Creek or Member of the same, having such or the like Coat-Cocquet, or Sufferance for that Purpose, on such or the like sufficient Security being first given for the landing and discharging of the same, in some other Port, Member, Creek, or Part of the said Kingdom, and returning a Certificate in Six Months, as is required by Law, in Cases where Goods, which are liable to pay Duties on Exportation, are carried Coastwise from one Port of Great Britain to another; nor to prohibit such or so much of any of the aforesaid Articles as shall be necessary, from being exported or carried out in any Ships or Vessels in their Voyages, out and Home, for the Sustainance of the Persons on board of such Ships or Vessels only; or for victualling or providing any of His Majesty's Ships of War, or other Ships in His Majesty's Service; or for the Use of His Majesty's Forces, Forts or Garrisons.—And His Majesty is further pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, by the Advice aforesaid, that from and after the Publication of this Order in the London Gazette, and until further Order, the Importation of Wheat, Wheat-Flour, Rye, Rye-Meal, Barley, Barley-Meal, Oats, and Oat-Meal, shall be allowed into the Ports of that Part of Great Britain called England, and into the Ports of Wales, and into Berwick upon Tweed, upon Payment of the Duties, commonly called the Low Duties, only.—And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.
