P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS, by Order in Council of the 25th of June, 1788, the Importation of Wheat of the Growth of any of the Territories belonging to the United States of America, was prohibited, until His Majesty's Pleasure should be further signified: And whereas it hath been represented to His Majesty at this Board, that it appears, by Accounts received from His Majesty's Consul General at New York, and by the Information of several Merchants of the City of London, and others, trading to America, that the Hessian Fly, by which the Wheat of the Growth of the Territories of the said United States of America was infected in former Years, had this Season wholly disappeared: His Majesty, taking the same into Consideration, is pleased, with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, That the said Prohibition, laid by Order in Council of the 25th of June, 1788, be, and the same is hereby, taken off.—And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS it hath been represented to His Majesty at this Board, that, by reason of the defective Execution of the Law respecting the Exportation and Importation of Corn and Grain, the

Prices thereof cannot be properly ascertained for regulating and governing the Exportation and Importation thereof, in many Parts of Great Britain. And whereas it is expedient that a sufficient Supply of Wheat, Rye, Barley and Oats, and Flour or Meal made thereof, should be secured and retained within this Kingdom: And whereas there is reason to believe that, from the Deficiencies of the Crops in several Foreign Parts, very extensive Commissions have been received, and may hereafter be received, for purchasing in Great Britain Wheat, Rye, Barley and Oats, or Flour or Meal made thereof, for the Supply of such Foreign Parts. And whereas the Parliament standing prorogued to the 21st Day of January, 1790, His Majesty has not an Opportunity of speedily taking the Advice of His Parliament: In order therefore to fulfill the Intention of the Legislature, by curing to His faithful Subjects a sufficient Supply of Wheat, Rye, Barley, Beans and Oats, and Flour and Meal made thereof, His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth order, and it is hereby ordered, that no Person or Persons whatever shall, from and after the Publication of this Order in the London Gazette, until further Order, directly or indirectly export, transport, carry or convey, or cause or procure to be exported, transported, carried or conveyed, out of or from any Port or Place in Great Britain, or load or lay on board, or cause or procure to be loaded or laid on board, of any Ship, Vessel or Boat, in order to be exported or carried out of any Port or Place in Great Britain, any Wheat, Wheat-Flour, Rye, Rye-Meal, Barley, Barley-Meal, Malt, Bread, Biscuit, Oats, Oat-Meal and Beans: His Majesty hath, nevertheless, thought fit to order,

order, and doth hereby order, that nothing herein contained shall extend to prohibit any Person or Persons to ship or put on board any of the Articles aforesaid, to be carried Coastwise, that is to say, from any Port, Creek, Member or Part of the Kingdom of Great Britain, to any other Port, Creek or Member of the same, having such or the like Coast-Cocquet, or Sufferance for that Purpose, on such or the like sufficient Security being first given for the landing and discharging of the same, in some other Port, Member, Creek, or Part of the said Kingdom, and returning a Certificate in Six Months, as is required by Law, in Cases where Goods, which are liable to pay Duties on Exportation, are carried Coastwise from one Port of Great Britain to another; nor to prohibit such or so much of any of the aforesaid Articles as shall be necessary, from being exported or carried out in any Ships or Vessels in their Voyages, out and Home, for the Sustenance of the Persons on board of such Ships or Vessels only; or for victualling or providing any of His Majesty's Ships of War, or other Ships in His Majesty's Service; or for the Use of His Majesty's Forces, Ports or Garrisons.—And His Majesty is further pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, by the Advice aforesaid, that from and after the Publication of this Order in the London Gazette, and until further Order, the Importation of Wheat, Wheat-Flour, Rye, Rye-Meal, Barley, Barley-Meal, Oats, and Oat-Meal, shall be allowed into the Ports of that Part of Great Britain called England, and into the Ports of Wales, and into Berwick upon Tweed, upon Payment of the Duties, commonly called the Low Duties, only.—And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS divers Persons, to whom Money has been issued for Public Services, have neglected to deliver into this Office the Vouchers for the Expenditure thereof, together with an Account Current, in the Manner, and within the Time prescribed by the Act for better examining and Auditing the Public Accounts of this Kingdom, the Commissioners for Auditing the Public Accounts have directed that Copies of the following Sections of the said Act be inserted in the London Gazette, in order that all Persons to whom Public Money has been, or shall be, so issued, may be informed of the Consequences of such Neglect.

SECTION XVII. And whereas great Losses and Inconveniences have arisen to the Public, by Sub-Accountants not having been put in Charge till a long Time has elapsed after the Monies were issued to them, be it enacted, That the Paymaster-General of His Majesty's Forces, the Treasurer of the Navy, the Treasurer of the Ordnance, and every other Public Officer who shall hereafter pay into the Hands of any Person or Persons whomsoever, Money for Public Services, by Way of Imprest or on Account, shall, within Thirty Days of the 31st Day of December, One thousand seven hundred and eighty-five, and within Thirty Days of the 31st Day of December in every future Year, transmit an Account of all Sums of Money issued or paid by him or them to any Person or Persons, for the Public Service, within the preceding Year, to the Commissioners to be appointed under the Authority of this Act; who shall, and they are hereby required forthwith to transmit Duplicates of the same to His Majesty's Remembrancer in the Court of Exchequer, who shall immediately, on Receipt of such Accounts, put the several Sums so issued in Charge against the Parties, in like Manner as is now practised with respect to Persons who receive Money by Way of Imprest, and on Account, at the Receipt of His Majesty's Exchequer.

SECTION XVIII. Provided always, and be it enacted, That no Accountant shall be allowed in his Account any Sum which he shall issue or pay over to any Sub-Accountants, unless he shall have transmitted to the said Commissioners regular Accounts thereof, in the Manner and within the Times abovementioned; unless Proof shall be produced, to the Satisfaction of the Lord High Treasurer, or the Commissioners of the Treasury, that any Failure of transmitting the same did not happen from the wilful Neglect of the Person issuing or paying over the Money as aforesaid.

SECTION XX. And be it further enacted and declared, That every Sub-Accountant to whom Money shall hereafter be issued for Public Services, in case the Money so issued shall have been for Services to be performed in Great Britain, shall deliver into the Office of the Commissioners to be appointed by virtue of this Act, the Vouchers for the Expenditure thereof, together with an Account Current, within Three Months of the End of each Year from the Commencement of his Account, unless

unless it has been usual for such Account to be made up to any fixed Period in the Year; in which Case they shall be delivered within Three Months of the usual annual Time of the Determination of each Account respectively; and in case such Monies shall have been issued for Services to be performed in any Part of Europe out of this Kingdom, then the Vouchers shall be delivered within Four Months of the Expiration of each Year's Accounts; if in the West Indies, the Continent of America, or in Africa, within Six Months after the Expiration of each Year's Accounts; and if in the East Indies, within Twelve Months after the Expiration of each Year's Accounts; unless it shall in each and every Case be made appear to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of the Treasury, that the Failure of transmitting the same, within the Periods beforementioned, was unavoidable; in which Case such further Delay may be granted by Warrant under the Hands of the Commissioners of the Treasury, or any Three of them, as they shall judge reasonable; and in such Cases the Vouchers shall be delivered at the Expiration of the Term of Delay so granted, on Pain, upon Failure in any of the abovementioned Cases, of paying such Fine to His Majesty as the Court of Exchequer, on Application made to them, shall think fit to set and impose; which Fine the said Court is hereby authorized and empowered to set and impose accordingly.

SECTION XXII. Provided always, and be it enacted, that when any Sub-Accountant or Sub-Accountants shall transmit to the Commissioners, to be appointed under the Authority of this Act, a sufficient and satisfactory Discharge from the Principal Officers of the Ordnance, the Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy, the Commissioners for Visitualling His Majesty's Navy, or the Commissioners of Sick and Hurt, for any Monies he or they shall have received in the said Departments severally, the said Commissioners shall transmit a Duplicate of the same to His Majesty's Remembrancer in the Court of Exchequer, who shall forthwith strike out the Name or Names of such Sub-Accountant or Sub-Accountants from the Imprest Roll; and such Sub-Accountant or Sub-Accountants shall from thenceforth be discharged from any other or further Account for the same.
