**T**HE King has been pleased to grant to Philip Attle, of Colne Park, in the County of Essex, Esq; and his Issue, His Royal Licence and Authority to assume and take the Surname, and bear the Arms of Hills, in Compliance with the Will of Michael Robert Hills, late of Colne Park aforesaid, Esq; deceased; such Arms being first duly exemplified according to the Laws of Arms, and recorded in the Heralds Office: And also to order that this His Majesty's Concession and Declaration be registered in His College of Arms.

This Day the Baron de Kutzleben, Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary from his Serene Highness the Landgrave of Hesse Cassel, had his Audience of Leave of his Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland;

And afterwards Monsieur Lavezzari, Resident from the Republic of Venice, had his first Private Audience of his Royal Highness:

*Dublin Castle, January 5, 1790.*

His Excellency the Earl of Westmorland, Lord Lieutenant of this Kingdom, embarked on Board His Majesty's Yacht the Dorset, at Holyhead, Yesterday, at Eleven o'Clock in the Forenoon, and arrived early this Morning off Howth, where his Excellency landed about Nine o'Clock, and proceeded to the Seat of the Earl of Howth. A Squadron of Horse was immediately dispatched thither, and attended his Excellency to this City. The Infantry of the Garrison lined the Streets through which his Excellency passed on his Way to the Castle, and upon his Arrival there he was introduced in Form to the Lords Justices, who received him under the Canopy of State in the Presence Chamber; from whence a Procession was made in the usual State to the Council Chamber. The Council sitting, his Excellency's Commission was read, and the Oaths being administered to him, his Excellency was invested with the Collar of the Most Illustrious Order of St. Patrick, and received the Sword of State from the Lords Justices. The great Guns in His Majesty's Phoenix Park were then fired, and answered by Volleys from the Regiments on Duty. His Excellency afterwards repaired to the Presence Chamber, and received the Compliments of the Nobility and other Persons of Distinction upon his safe Arrival, and taking upon him the Government of this Kingdom.
