THIS Day the Lords being met, a Message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by Sir Francis Molyneux, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by virtue of His Majesty's Commission, for declaring His Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate Attendance of this Honourable House in the House of Peers, to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and the Duke of Leeds, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to*

An Act for the better Support of the Dignity of the Speaker of the House of Commons, and for disabling the Speaker of the House of Commons, for the Time being, from holding any Office or Place of Profit during Pleasure under the Crown:

An Act for defraying the Charge of Pay and Cloathing of the Militia in that Part of Great Britain called England, for One Year, beginning the Twenty-fifth Day of March, One thousand seven hundred and ninety.

An Act to amend Two Acts, made in the Twenty-eighth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, the one intitled, An Act for regulating the Trade between the Subjects of His Majesty's Colonies and Plantations in North America and in the West India Islands, and the Countries belonging to the United States of America, and between His Majesty's said Subjects and the Foreign Islands in the West Indies; and the other intitled, An Act to allow the Importation of Rum or other Spirits from His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations in the West Indies into the Province of Quebec, without Payment of Duty, under certain Conditions and Restrictions.

An Act to continue the Laws now in Force for regulating the Trade between the Subjects of His Ma-

jefty's Dominions and the Inhabitants of the Territories belonging to the United States of America, so far as the same relate to the Trade and Commerce carried on between this Kingdom and the Inhabitants of the Countries belonging to the said United States.

An Act to indemnify such Persons as have omitted to qualify themselves for Offices and Employments, and to indemnify Justices of the Peace or others who have omitted to register or deliver in their Qualifications within the Time limited by Law, and for giving further Time for those Purposes; and to indemnify Members and Officers in Cities, Corporations and Borough Towns, whose Admissions have been omitted to be stamped according to Law, or, having been stamped, have been lost or mislaid, and for allowing them Time to provide Admissions duly stamped; to give further Time to such Persons as have omitted to make and file Affidavits of the Execution of Inditures of Clerks to Attornies and Solicitors; and for indemnifying Deputy Lieutenants and Officers of the Militia who have neglected to transmit Descriptions of their Qualifications to the Clerks of the Peace within the Time limited by Law, and for giving further Time for that Purpose.

An Act for continuing the Term of so much of an Act, made in the Twenty-third Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, as relates to the rendering the Payment of Creditors more equal and expeditious in that Part of Great Britain called Scotland.

An Act for taking off the Duties upon unwrought Tin exported to any of the Countries beyond the Cape of Good Hope.

An Act for rebuilding the Parish Church and Tower of Saint Thomas, within the City of Bristol.

An Act for better supplying the City of Norwich and the Parts adjacent with Water.

An Act for making and maintaining a navigable Communication between Stowmarket and Ipswich in the County of Suffolk.

An Act for the better Relief and Employment of the Poor within the Hundreds of Colneis and Carlford, in the County of Suffolk.

An Act to alter and amend an Act, passed in the last Session of Parliament, for making and maintaining a navigable Canal from or from near to Cromford Bridge in the County of Derby, to join and communicate with the Erewash Canal at or near Langley Bridge, and also a Collateral Cut from the said intended Canal at or near Codner Park Mill to or near Pinxton Mill, in the said County.

An Act to empower William Henry Campbell, Esq; to shut up a Road and Foot Paths in the Parish of Liston, in the County of Effx, and to oblige him to make and keep in Repair for the future another Road and Foot Path in Lieu thereof.

An Act for continuing an Act of the Tenth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, for amending the Road from Saint Stephen's Gate in the City of Norwich to Block Hill in Trowse, at the Angle where the Road divides to Bixley and Kirby in the County of Norfolk.

An Act for continuing an Act of the Ninth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, for amending the Road from Bishopsgate Bridge in the City of Norwich to a Stone called the Two Mile Stone, where the Norwich Road joins the Caister Causeway, Two Miles and a Half short of the Town of Great Yarmouth.

An Act for continuing an Act of the Twelfth Year of His present Majesty for repairing and amending the Road from Berjstreet Gates in the City of Norwich to New Buckenham in the County of Norfolk.

An Act to enlarge the Term and Powers of an Act, passed in the Tenth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, for repairing, widening and altering the Road from Macclesfield in the County of Cheshire to the Turnpike Road at Randle Carr Lane Head, in Fernilee, in the County of Derby, leading to Chapel in the Frith.

An Act for enlarging the Term and Powers of an Act of the Eighth Year of His present Majesty, for amending, widening and keeping in Repair several Roads leading to and through the Town of Goudhurst, in the County of Kent.

An Act for continuing the Term, and altering and enlarging the Powers of certain Acts of Parliament, for repairing the Roads from Royston in the County of Hertford to Wandesford Bridge in the County of Huntingdon, and from the Town of Huntingdon to the Causeway at or near the West End of the Town of Somersham in the County of Huntingdon, so far as relates to the Middle and South Divisions and separate District of the said Roads.

An Act for enlarging the Term of an Act of the Eleventh Year of His present Majesty, for repairing, widening and keeping in Repair several Roads leading from Tavernspike to the Towns of Pembroke and Tenby, and to Hubberston Haking in the County of Pembroke.

An Act to enlarge the Term and Powers of an Act, passed in the Twenty-eighth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, for repairing and widening the Road from the Leicester and Welford Turnpike Road, in the Counties of Leicester and Northampton, near Foston Lane, to the Turnpike Road leading from Hinckley to Ashby de la Zouch, in the said County of Leicester; and for repairing and widening Two Pieces of Road, called Hunt's Lane and Wood Lane, in the Parishes of Desford and Newbold Verdon.

An Act for making and repairing the Road from Newmill Bridge, by Foodie's Mill, Inverkeithing, Aberdour, Kirkcaldy, Gallatown, and Cameron Bridge to Craill, and other Roads, in the County of Fife.

An Act for enlarging the Term of several Acts, made for repairing the Roads from Stump Crofs to New-

market Heath, and from Stump Crofs aforesaid to the End of the Town of Trumpington, next to Shelsford, and from Shelsford Pound to Wittlesford; and for making more effectual Provision for repairing the said Roads, and also One Mile of the Road between Trumpington and Cambridge, commencing at the South End of Trumpington aforesaid; and for amending the Road from Chesterford Bridge to the End of Wittlesford, next to Shelsford, all in the County of Cambridge.

An Act to enlarge the Term and Powers of so much of an Act, made in the Ninth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, as relates to the amending, widening, altering, clearing and keeping in Repair several Roads leading from the Borough of Dorchester, in the County of Dorset.

An Act for enlarging the Terms and altering the Powers of Two Acts, made in the Sixteenth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty, and in the Ninth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, for repairing the Roads leading from Marlborough, through West Kennet, to Sheppards Shord, and from the Hare and Hounds in Beckhampton, to the Top of Cherrill Hill, and from the Town of Avebury to the Cross Way at Beckhampton, and from the Turnpike Gate at Avebury to Wroughion, and from the North Side of Swinden to the Carpenter's Arms in Blunsden, in the County of Wilts; and for diverting, turning and altering Part of the said Roads, and for repairing and widening the Road on the West Side of the Three Barrows, from the Direction Post there on the New Road leading from Beckhampton to Devizes, to the Distance of One Mile from the said Direction Post Westward.

An Act for continuing the Term and enlarging, altering and amending the Powers of an Act, made in the Tenth Year of his present Majesty, for repairing, widening and keeping in Repair the Road from New Chappell in the County of Surry, over Copthorn in the County of Suffex, through Lindfield to the Town of Ditchling, up to the Top of Ditchling Post Hills, in the said County of Suffex.

An Act for repairing and widening the Road from Rowde Ford to Red Hill, and from Chittoe Heath to the Town of Calne in the County of Wilts; and for repealing Three Acts made in the Second and Twenty-fifth Years of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Second, and in the Twenty-third Year of His present Majesty, for repairing the Highways between Sheppards Shord and Horsley Upright Gate, leading down Bagdown Hill in the County of Wilts, and other ruinous Parts, of the Highways thereunto adjacent.

An Act for continuing the Term, and altering and enlarging the Powers of certain Acts, made for repairing the Road from Heigbley in the West Riding of the County of York, to Kirkby in Kendal in the County of Westmorland, so far as relates to such Part of the said Road as lies within the County of York.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

W H E R E A S by an Act made in the Twenty-third Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, "An Act for preventing certain Instruments from being required from Ships belonging to the United States of America; and to give to His Majesty, for a limited Time, certain Powers for the better carrying on Trade and Commerce between the Subjects of His Majesty's Dominions and the Inhabitants

of

“ of the said United States;” which said Act has been continued by several subsequent Acts until the Fifth Day of April, 1790. And whereas by an Act made in the Twenty-fourth Year of His present Majesty's Reign, intituled, “ An Act to extend the Powers of an Act, made in the Twenty-third Year of His present Majesty, for giving His Majesty certain Powers for the better carrying on Trade and Commerce between the Subjects of His Majesty's Dominions and the Inhabitants of the United States of America, to the Trade and Commerce of this Kingdom with the British Colonies and Plantations in America, with Respect to certain Articles therein mentioned,” the Powers given by the said recited Act were extended to the Trade and Intercourse between this Kingdom and the British Colonies and Plantations in America, so far as the same might relate to Iron, Hemp and Sailcloth, and other Articles of the Produce of any Place bordering on the Baltic, which might be exported from this Kingdom; which last mentioned Act has also by several subsequent Acts been continued until the said 5th Day of April, 1790.

And whereas by another Act passed in this present Session of Parliament, intituled, “ An Act to continue the Laws now in Force for regulating the Trade between the Subjects of His Majesty's Dominions and the Inhabitants of the Territories belonging to the United States of America, so far as the same relate to the Trade and Commerce carried on between this Kingdom and the Inhabitants of the Countries belonging to the said United States;” it is declared to be expedient that the said Act of the Twenty-third Year of His present Majesty's Reign, so far only as the same extends to the Trade and Commerce carried on between this Kingdom and the People and Territories belonging to the United States of America; and also that the said Act of the Twenty-fourth Year of His Majesty's Reign should be further continued and be in Force; and it is thereby enacted, That the said Acts shall continue and be in Force until the 5th Day of April, 1791; His Majesty doth thereupon, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order and declare, That any Unmanufactured Goods and Merchandizes, the Importation of which into this Kingdom is not prohibited by Law, (except Fish, Oil, Blubber, Whale-Fins and Spermacei;) and any Pig Iron, Bar Iron, Pitch, Tar, Turpentine, Rosin, Pot-Ash, Pearl-Ash, Indico, Mafts, Yards and Bowsprits, being the Growth or Production of any of the Territories of the United States of America, and no other Goods or Merchandize, may (until further Order) be imported directly from thence into any of the Ports of this Kingdom, either in British-built Ships, owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law, or in Ships built in the Countries belonging to the United States of America, or any of them; and owned by the Subjects of the said United States, or any of them, and whereof the Master and Three-fourths of the Mariners at least are Subjects of the said United States, or any of them; and may be entered and landed in any Port of this Kingdom, upon Payment of the same Duties as the like Sorts of Goods or Merchandize are or may be subject and liable to if imported in British-built Ships, owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law, from any British Island or Plantation in America, notwithstanding such Goods or Merchandize, or the Ships in which the same may be brought, may not be accompanied with the Certificates or

other Documents heretofore required by Law. And it is hereby further ordered, that there shall be the same Drawbacks and Bounties on Merchandizes and Goods exported from Great Britain into the Territories of the said United States of America, or any of them, as are or may hereafter be allowed by Law, upon the Exportation of the like Goods or Merchandize to any of the Islands, Plantations, or Colonies, belonging to the Crown of Great Britain in America; and that (until further Order) there shall be allowed and paid the same Drawbacks on the Exportation of any Sort of Foreign Hemp or Foreign Iron exported from Great Britain into any British Colony or Plantation in America, or into the Territories of the United States of America, or any of them, as are or may hereafter be allowed by Law upon the Exportation of the like Sort of Hemp or Iron, and under the same Rules, Regulations, Restrictions, Penalties and Forfeitures in all Respects, as such Drawbacks are allowed and paid, or are subject and liable to by Law, upon the Exportation of such Hemp and Iron into other Foreign Parts.

And His Majesty is hereby further pleased to order, That any Tobacco, being the Growth or Production of any of the Territories of the said United States of America, may (until further Order) be imported, in Manner before-mentioned, upon Payment of the same Duties as Tobacco imported by British Subjects from any British Colony or Plantation is or may hereafter be subject to; but under and subject nevertheless to all and singular the Regulations of an Act made and passed in the Twenty-ninth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, “ An Act for repealing the Duties on Tobacco and Snuff, and for granting new Duties in Lieu thereof.”

And His Majesty is further pleased to order, That any Rice, being the Growth or Production of any of the Territories of the United States of America, which shall be imported directly from thence into any of the Ports of this Kingdom, in Manner above-mentioned, may, upon the Importer paying down, in ready Money, the Duty of Eight-pence the Hundred Weight, being Part of the Duties now payable on the Importation of Rice, be landed and warehoused (except as hereinafter excepted) under His Majesty's Locks, in such Warehouses as shall be approved of for that Purpose by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, or any Four or more of them, upon the Importer's own Bond for Payment of the Remainder of the Duties due and payable for such Rice, within Eighteen Months, according to the net Weight and Quantity of such Rice at the Time it shall be so landed: But it is His Majesty's Pleasure nevertheless, that upon the Importation of any such Rice into the Ports of London, Bristol, Portsmouth, Cowes, Liverpool, Lancaster, Falmouth, Poole, Whitehaven, Hull, Greenock, and Port Glasgow, or either of them, in the Manner herein before expressed, the Importer shall be at Liberty, (until further Order) to enter and land the same without Payment of any Duty whatever; in which Case such Rice shall be warehoused under the joint Locks of His Majesty and the Proprietors, in such Warehouse or Warehouses as shall be approved for that Purpose, by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, or any Four or more of them; every Expence attending which warehousing shall be borne by the said Proprietors, and that such Proprietor or Proprietors, or his or their known Agent, shall from Time to Time, at all reasonable Hours, as Occasion may require, have free Access to such Warehouses, in the Preference

of some proper Officer of the Customs, for the Purpose of Screening and shifting the Rice, to prevent its receiving Damage. And that if any Rice which shall be so imported from the Territories of the said United States into any of the Ports abovementioned respectively, and warehoused as aforesaid, shall be taken out of the Warehouses wherein the same shall be secured, under the joint Locks of His Majesty and the Proprietors as aforesaid; for Home Consumption, the full Duties due and payable upon the Importation of such Rice into this Kingdom for Home Consumption, shall, previously to its being taken out of such Warehouses, be paid to the Collector of His Majesty's Customs at the Ports where such Rice shall be so warehoused; but that such Proprietor, if he intends to export such Rice, shall have Liberty to export the same from such Warehouses respectively, under the usual Regulations, without Payment of any Duty whatever; and that if any Rice which shall have been imported into any Port of this Kingdom, not herein before specially named, and shall have been warehoused upon the Importer's Bond in Manner aforesaid, shall, within the Time herein before mentioned, be taken out of the Warehouse wherein it shall have been so secured, to be exported directly from thence, the Bond entered into for the Payment of the said Duties thereon shall be discharged in like Manner as Bonds entered into for the Duties upon Tobacco, are directed to be discharged by any Act of Parliament in Force.

And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.
