33^d Regiment of Foot, Hon. John Tufton to be Ensign, by Purchase, vice Walter Elliot, promoted.

34th Regiment of Foot, Lieutenant Robert Owen, from the Half-Pay of the 3^d Regiment of Foot, to be Lieutenant, vice John St. Leger, who exchanges.

60th (or the Royal American) Regiment of Foot, Ensign Robert Gordon to be Adjutant, without Purchase, vice James Hamilton Gordon, deceased.

Dublin-Castle, April 5, 1790.

This Day his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant went in State to the House of Peers, and being seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, the Honorable Henry Fane, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from his Excellency to the House of Commons, signifying his Pleasure that they should immediately attend his Excellency in the House of Peers; and the Commons being come thither accordingly, his Excellency gave the Royal Assent to

An Act for granting to His Majesty the Duty therein mentioned, to be paid to the Trustees of the Royal Exchange.

An Act for granting the Sum of Five Thousand Pounds to the Dublin Society, for the Purposes therein mentioned.

An Act for granting the Sum of Four Thousand Pounds to the Trustees of the Linen Manufacture, and for other Purposes.

An Act for granting the several Sums therein mentioned for certain Pious and Charitable Purposes.

An Act for continuing and amending several Laws relating to His Majesty's Revenue, and for the more effectually preventing of Frauds therein, and for other Purposes therein mentioned.

An Act for the more effectual Application of the Sum of One Thousand Pounds granted by King's Letter for the Support and Repair of the Cathedral Church of Down, and for defraying the Expences attending the Celebration of Divine Worship therein.

An Act for the Amendment of the Turnpike Road leading from the City of Kilkenny to the Town of Clonmell, and thence to the Bounds of the County of Cork, and to provide for the better Repair of the said Road.

An Act to repeal an Act, passed in the Twenty-fifth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Second, entitled, An Act for repairing the Road leading from the Town of Clonmell, in the County of Tipperary, through the Towns of Fetbard and Killinall, in the said County, to the Town of Hurlingford, in the County of Kilkenny.

An Act for improving and repairing the Turnpike Road leading from Kinnegad to Athlone.

An Act for continuing and amending the several Acts for making, widening and repairing so much of the Road leading from the City of Limerick to the City of Cork as lies within the County or County of the City of Cork, that is to say, from the Bounds of the Counties of Limerick and Cork, between the Towns of Kilmallock and Charleville, to the City of Cork; and to continue an Act, passed in the Twenty-eighth Year of His present Majesty, entitled, An Act to continue and amend an Act passed in the Fifth Year of His late Majesty's Reign, entitled, An Act for repairing the Road leading from the Town of Newcastle, in the County of Limerick, to the City of Limerick, and from thence to the City of Cork.
