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From Chursday July 11. to Maicday July 15. 1678.

Naples, June 21.

UR Viceroy is using all imaginable endeavors to raise a Fond of 200000 Crowns, to be employed in the present conjuncture, but he meets with much difficulty in it; for the Merchants who should survish the same, pretend to be unable at this time to raise this Sum. All the French that were prisoners here, except some persons of quality, have been set at liberty. Our Gallies are sitting out with all diligence; so soon as they are ready, which, it's thought, may be about the end of this month, they will sail to Reggio, to join the Spanish Armada there, and pass to Catalonia, whither they will carry 4000 men. The Viceroy of Sicily has orders from Spain to hold his Residence at Melsina, and to consirm to that City allits antient Priviledges, save onely, that the Castle will be guarded by Spaniards.

Venice, July 2. The I etters we receive from Turky, speak high of the preparations that have been made, and are still making throughout all the Octoman Territories, for a War against the Moscovites, which, it's believed, is by this time broken out, the endeavors that were used for the composing of matters having been without any estate. By a Tartane come from Messina we have an account, that the Vicetoy of Sicily was come thither from Palermo, being resolved to reside there for the suture.

Vienna. June 30. The motions of the Rebels in Hungary does somewhat alarm us. According to our last advices from those parts, they have got together a Body of 14 or 15000 men, and with them are come softar as to block up Cascham. That Major General Leslie has posted himself with 4000 men to guard a certain passage which is of very great importance. The Ministers that are here from the King of Denmark, and the Elector of Brandenburgh, use great endeavors, as we are informed, to persuade the Emperor not to accept the Conditions for Peace, as now proposed.

Dino, July 3. By the last Letters from Hungary we are informed, that the Rebels have actually belieged Caschaw, upon which orders are sent to the Imperial Troops in Silesia to march with all diligence to Hungary. We have advice that the Negoriation which was on foot between the Turks and the Mostovites for the composing matters, is quite broken off, and that a very bloudy War is like to ensue between them.

Hamburg, July 8. We are every day expecting to hear that the Elector of Brandenburg has taken the Field, it is agreed on all hands that his design is upon straelford, and that at the same time the Danes will make a descent upon the Isle of Lugen. From Copenhagen they write, that the Danes belieged the Castle of Elsenburg, and that they doubted not but to be Masters of it in a day or two. The Sieur Guldenlieu has not yet taken Bahua, the Besieged making a very good defence,

Ditto, July 12. We do not hear that the Elector of Brandenburg is as yet gone into the Field; his Troops are ready to march, as well as those of the Dukes of Lunenburg, and onely expect orders. From Copenbagen they advise, that the Danes were again Maiters of the Town and Carle of Elsenburg; which was surrendred to them the 8th instant, after three days attack.

Copenbagen, July 9. The 8th inflant in the evening the Casse of Essenburg was surrendred to the Danes, the Garison that marched out consisted in 250 men, commanded by Colonel Karel Haar. The Casse is very much ruined by our Bombes. Yesterday arrived a person here who came from the Camp before Eabus, he tells us, that the Besieged defended themselves very vigorously. Yesterday and the day before came hither two Munster Regiments, one of Foot, and another of Horse, who were presently sent over to Landscroon. The Suedish Fleet continues at Calmar, and our fleet to cruise on their Coass. Here is news in Town, that on Wednesday last the Suedes made a general Affault upon Christianssad, and that they were beaten off with great loss, which needs a confirmation.

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Baden, Fuly 5. The Cantons, which are at prefent affembled here, being somewhat alarmed at the
approach of the French, and at the design they seem
to have to attack Rhinfeldt, and the other forest
Towns, have resolved tokend Deputies to the Mareschal de Crequi to desire he will not attempt any
thing upon the said places; and because it is necessary
no time be lost in this matter, the said Deputies are
ordered to part this day on their journy to the French
Camp.

Basse, Fuly 5. The French Army under the command of the Mareschal de Crequi, is come to Haltingen. They are laying a Bridge over the Rhins at Hunningen, and the Sieur de Monclar is posted on the other side of the Rhine at Michelselden. Yesterday they burnt the Casse of Brombach, and they are at present working to mine and blow up the Casse of Rosein. The Imperial Army lies at Stauffen, and their parties meet frequently and skirmish.

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Francfort, July 8. The last advice we had from Allace, was, that the Imperial Army continued to observe very closely the French, and was following them towards Basse; that the Suisse Cantons were very much troubled to see them come so near their Territories, and to have designs upon the forest Towns, which they looks upon as in a manner under their protection, and for that reason had resolved to send Deputies to the Mareschal de Grequi to pray him not to act any hostility against the said places; in whose preservation they had so great an interest From Vienna we have an account, that the Rebels in Hungary are come so strong as to date to lay a formal Siege to Casebaw, and that the Imperial Generals were drawing what force they could together to relieve it.

Cologne, July 12. We have Letters from Bafle

of the 8th instant, which say, that the Mareschal de Crequi is come into their neighborhood, having removed his Camp from Emetingben to Haltirgen; that he had caused a Bridge to be made over the Khine at Hunnningben, that Monsieur Monelar was with a Body of Men on this side the Rhine at Michfeild, near Basse, and that Monsieur Boussars was with another Body between Basse and Rhinfeldt, where Count Staremberg was arrived with an Imperial detachement; that the Duke of Lorrain followed the Mareschal de Crequi, having stayed some days for a great Convoy of Provisions, which was brought to the Army with some difficulty.

Bruffels, July 15. The appearances of War encreafing daily, his Excellency the Duke de Villa Hermofa applies himf. If to make the necessary preparations for it. All the Wagens of Brabant are fummoned in, and his Highness the Prince of Orange is expected here, and then it's believed some resolution will be taken for the relief of Mons, from whence we have Letters of the 12 inflant, which fay, that the French endeavouring every day more and more to straiten the place, had posted themselves in the Church of a neighbouring Village, from whence they sent out small parties to hinder the Labourers who were cutting Forage, and reaping Corn, under the Cannon of the Out-works; the Duke d'Aerfehot thereupon sent out of the Town likewise some men so secure the Workmen; which the Baron de Quincy not being able to fuffer, comes on Monday last with a party of Horse and Dragoons to attack our men, who under the favor of the Cannon, defended them--felves so well, that after a brisk dispute, the Enemy was forced to retire, with the loss of above 300 men, and 30 Officers. The Bodies of Colonel Annequin, and of another Officer, were brought into the Town, as likewise the Chevalier de Momma, Captain of Dragoons was wounded and taken prisoner. The Count de Longuevalle Colonel of Dragoons, was dangerously wounded, and the Major of his Regiment lost his Leg. On our side there was only one or two killed, and about 20 wounded. Since this Rencounter we hear the French are breaking ground. as if they intended a formal Siege, at least they are making a Battery upon the Hill above the Town towards Binch, from whence they threaten to batter the Town with 30 pieces of Cannon. 'The Prince of Orange's Army continues encamped on the other fide of Vilvord, as does the French Army at Limbes, keeping a strong Guard in Hall to keep all relief from Mons. From the French places we have advice of the defeat of Count Staremburg near Rhinfeldt, of which our Letters from Basle of the 8th in-Hant, give not any account.

Amsterdam, Fuly 15. From the Hague they write, that the Lord Ambassador Temple was arrived there from England, and that he had had Conferences with the Deputies of the States, who we are told are simily resolved to continue the War in case France still persists in the resolution of not quitting the Towns in Flanders? I from whence we have advice of a Rençounter that happened the 12th instant between some of the Paron de Quiney's Troops, and a party sent out of Mons to guard the Labourers who were Foraging in their neighborhood, in which the French were repulsed with considerable loss. The Duke de Villa Hermosa is preparing, as we understand, is Convoy to put into Mons; and the Prince of Orange purposes to part in sew days to the Army.

Hague, July 14. On Wednesday in the asternoon Sir William Temple, Ambassador, Extraordinary from His Majel'y of Great Britain, arrived here from England, together with the Sicur Van Leeinen, Envoy of this State; and this afternoon his Excellency had a Conscrence with the Deput is of the States. The letters from Nimegnen, say, that the French perfect in their Resolution not to quit the places, in Handers, so that there seems at present not any hopes of Peace. We are told that his Highiess purposes to go hence to the Army on Tuesday next. The Hecr Odyke returned hither last night from Nimeguen.

Paris, July 20. The Letters we receive from Germany, give us an account of another Action fince that at Rhinfelt, which hath happened between the French and the Germans, to the disadvantage, as is said here of the latter; however we have lost many brave Officers and Persons of Quality, and among others, the Marquis de Rannes Colonel-General of the Dragoons, and Licutenant-General of the Army, is killed. From Flanders we have nothing of moment, the Armies continuing hitherto quiet. Our Letters from Bayonne give its an account of the death of the Maroschal de Grammont

London, July 13. At the last Sessions held at the Old Baily, James Smith a Soldier in the Lord Generals Regiment of Foot, was indicted of Felony for deserting his Colors, and being convicted, he was sentenced to be hanged, and executed accordingly on Hounstow-Heath on Thursday last.
