The following Address of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland having been transmitted to the Right Honourable William Wyndham Grenville, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, has been by him presented to the King: Which Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

May it please your Majesty,

THE gracious Letter with which your Majesty hath honoured this Meeting of the General Assembly of this National Church, was received with the utmost Respect and Gratitude.

It affords us high Satisfaction in the Discharge of our Duty, that our Loyalty and Attachment to your Majesty's Person and Government; and our Zeal in promoting Christian Piety and Learning, and in encouraging true Religion and Virtue, have made a favourable Impression upon your Royal Mind; and we shall proceed with Alacrity in a Line of Conduct which your Majesty has graciously declared will ensure us a Continuance of your paternal Affection and Regard. We cherish the Remembrance of the repeated Testimonies of Royal Approbation which we have formerly received; we look up to your Majesty as the Nourishing Father of the Church; and we rely on your Majesty's Determination to preserve and maintain the Church of Scotland, as by Law established, in the full and free Enjoyment of all its Rights and Privileges.

We trust that we shall never lose Sight of the primary and important Objects to which your Majesty is pleased to direct our Attention: And it is our Happiness to know, that we live under the Government of a Prince to whom we cannot give any Proof of Loyalty so acceptable as the Exertion of our strenuous Endeavours in maintaining the great Cause of Religion, in checking the Growth of Vice and Immorality, in enforcing Obedience to the Laws.

in promoting the Practice of all Christian Duties, and in diffusing a Spirit of Charity and Benevolence.

We regard the Appointment of the Earl of Leven to represent your Royal Person in the present Assembly as a fresh Mark of your Majesty's Favour to the Church of Scotland. His warm Attachment, like that of his Ancestors, to this Church; his Zeal for the Interests of Religion; the Virtues of his Life; and our happy Experience of those distinguished Qualifications, which have recommended him to your Majesty's repeated Choice; conspire to render him most acceptable to us in the Execution of the high and important Trust committed to him.

We receive with much Thankfulness your Royal Donation for promoting the Knowledge of the Protestant Religion in the Highlands and Islands of Scotland: And we shall study to shew ourselves not unworthy of the Confidence which your Majesty is pleased to repose in us, by applying it with Fidelity and Diligence to the pious and important Purpose for which it is bestowed.

Your Majesty has shewn the most gracious Attention to the Dignity and Efficacy of our Proceedings, by recommending Moderation and Propriety of Conduct. We wish most earnestly to avoid all unnecessary Disputes and Altercations; and we feel that it is the Duty of the Ministers of the Prince of Peace to set an Example of that Harmony and Good-Will which they inculcate upon the People committed to their Care, as most congenial to the Spirit of our Religion, and most essential to the Happiness of Society.

That the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, by whom Kings reign, may preserve your Majesty's Person, and direct your Councils; that He may bless the Queen, the Prince of Wales, and all the Royal Family; that He may continue to us the many National Blessings in which your Subjects now rejoice; that, after a long and prosperous Reign over a free, a happy, and a grateful People, you may receive that Crown which fadeth not away; and that a Race of Princes, descended from your Illustrious House, and formed after your Example, may, to latest Posterity, sway the British Sceptre with Moderation and Renown; are the earnest Prayers of,

WHEREAS it has been represented to the King, That there are at this Time several Deserters from the different Corps in His Majesty's Land Service, who might be induced to return to their Duty by an Offer of His Majesty's gracious Pardon, and that such an Instance of His Royal Clemency would have due Influence upon their fu-

ture Behavior; His Majesty is pleased to grant His free Pardon to all Deserters from His Land Forces who shall surrender themselves before the Tenth Day of July next, either to the Regiments to which they belong, or to some other Corps in His Majesty's Service, or to any Recruiting Party in Great Britain or Ireland.

Such Deserters, if able-bodied Men and fit for Service, shall be attested in the Corps to which they surrender, and not be liable to be claimed by any other Corps to which they may formerly have belonged.

And whereas many of the said Deserters may have enlisted in other Corps, and are now serving therein; His Majesty is graciously pleased to extend to such Deserters the Benefit of this Pardon, and to direct, that they shall continue to serve in the Corps wherein they now are, and not be claimed by that in which they formerly served.

And whereas several of the said Deserters have been apprehended, and are now in Gaol or in Regimental Custody; His Majesty is likewise pleased to grant to them His free Pardon, of which they are to have the Benefit upon their Arrival at their respective Regiments, or upon their being enlisted by some other Corps, or Recruiting Party.

Any Soldier who may desert, after these His Majesty's most gracious Intentions are made public, shall not be included in the above Pardon, but be proceeded against with the utmost Severity.
