And whereas feveral of the faid Deferters have been apprehended, and are now in Gaol or in Regimental Custody; His Majesty is likewise pleased to grant to them His free Pardon, of which they are to have the Benefit upon their Arrival at their respective Regiments, or upon their being inlisted by fome other Corps, or Recruiting Party.

Any Soldier who may defert, after these His Majesty's most gracious Intentions are made public, shall not be included in the above Pardon, but be proceeded against with the utmost Severity.
