And whereas many of the faid Deferters may have inlifted in other Corps, and are now ferving therein; His Majesty is graciously pleased to extend to such Deferters the Benefit of this Pardon, and to direct, that they shall continue to ferve in the Corps wherein they now are, and not be claimed by that in which they formerly ferved.

And whereas feveral of the faid Deferters have been apprehended, and are now in Gaol or in Regi-mental Custody; His Majesty is likewise pleased to grant to them His free Pardon, of which they are to have the Benefit upon their Arrival at their respective Regiments, or upon their being inlisted by fome other Corps, or Recruiting Party.

Any Soldier who may defert, after these His Majesty's most gracious Intentions are made public, shall not be included in the above Pardon, but be proceeded against with the utmost Severity.
