The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Proclamations of the 7th Day of May last, for granting Bounties for the Encouraging of Seamen and Landmen to enter themselves on Board His Majesty's Ships of War, and Rewards for discovering Seamen who may secrete themselves, will expire on the Thirtieth Day of this instant June: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the said Bounties and Rewards should continue to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, That the Time limited by the aforementioned Proclamations for granting the said Bounties and Rewards be prolonged and extended from the said Thirtieth Day of this instant June to the Thirty-first Day of August next inclusive, and that the Bounties and Rewards thereby given and granted be continued to be paid until the said Thirty-first Day of August: Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

THESSE are, by Order of the Right Honourable my Lords and others, Commissioners for the Affairs of the Royal Hospital at Chelsea, to give Notice, that all Out-Pensioners (as well Letter-Men as others) belonging to the said Hospital, residing in London, or within Twenty-five Miles thereof, are required to appear personally at the Secretary's Office in the said Hospital, and are required also to appear regularly on the respective Days appointed for them, as are hereafter mentioned; when Attendance will be given from Nine o'Clock in the Morning till Three in the Afternoon, in order to register their Appearances, viz.

And that all Out-Pensioners (as well Letter-Men as others) belonging to the said Hospital, who live at a greater Distance than Twenty-five Miles from London, and those in Scotland and Ireland, are hereby required and commanded, that after the 25th of December, and after every succeeding 25th of June and December till further Orders, they forthwith apply themselves to one of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace in the Neighbourhood where they reside, and make the following Affidavit, which the said Magistrate for the County, City, Borough, or Riding, before whom the Pensioner appears, will sign and date, viz.

I, _____, came before me, one of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the County of _____ and made Oath, that he was admitted an Out-Pensioner of Chelsea College, on the _____ Day of _____ 17 _____ from the _____ Regiment of _____ commanded by _____ was then aged about _____ Years, served in the Army _____ Years, was discharged for _____ and that he is no otherwise provided for by the Government, but as a Pensioner of the said College, and now lives in the Parish of _____ in the County of _____

Sworn before me, this _____ Day of _____ 17 _____ The Affidavit drawn according to the above Form, sworn before, dated and attested by a Magistrate, is to be put up in a Cover, and sent by the General Post (directed thus) "To the Right Hon. the Paymaster-General, at the Horse Guards, London." And that Counterparts, or Duplicates of the said Affidavits, are to be reserved by the Out-Pensioners respectively, to be exhibited to such Persons as shall be directed to pay them, that they may be satisfied that all such as may claim Out-Pensions are the real Persons entitled to receive the same.

To the End that the said Commissioners for the Affairs of the Hospital may be satisfied that they

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are the same Persons who have passed their Examinations; the Pensioners are hereby further directed, that such of them as have served in, and been discharged from; any of the Regiments or Independent Companies of Invalids, are not to mention in their Affidavits such Regiment or Company of Invalids in which they served, but the Regiment, Troop, or Corps of the Army from which they were first discharged, and recommended and received to Chelsea Hospital.

And as the General Payments in Great Britain and Ireland, at the End of the ensuing Six Months, are chiefly regulated by the Places of Residence mentioned by the Pensioners, who are mustered at Chelsea in Person, and in the Body of the Affidavits of such as live at a Distance, it is hereby ordered and directed, that no Pensioner who shall change the Place of his Abode given in at his Muster, or specified in his Affidavit aforesaid, and who may apply for his Pension, except to the Officers of Excise nearest such Place of Abode, shall receive the same, unless it appear by the Certificates of respectable Persons, that such Removal was through some unavoidable Necessity, which he or they could not foresee or prevent.

Lastly, It is notified, that none will be entered upon the Pay Lists of the said Hospital, or be thought entitled to receive any Benefit therefrom, who shall not act agreeable to these Orders and Directions.

CHELSEA HOSPITAL.

THESE are, by Order of the Right Honourable my Lords and others, Commissioners for managing the Affairs of the Royal Hospital at Chelsea, to give Notice, that His Majesty has been pleased to direct that all Out-Pensioners (Cavalry and Letter-Men excepted) belonging to the said Hospital, and residing in London or within the Distance of Twenty-five Miles thereof, do personally and regimentally appear at the said Hospital, on the several respective Days as are undermentioned and appointed for them, when and where Attendance will be given from Nine o'Clock in the Morning till Three in the Afternoon, in order to their being examined by proper Officers appointed for that Purpose. THERE being the greatest Reason to suspect that one William Lownds or Lowins, otherwise called William Hope, is the Person who robbed the Mail between Penrith and Keswick, on the 25th Day of February last (which Robbery was advertised in the London Gazette of Saturday the 6th Day of March last) he having negotiated at a Banker's in Newcastle upon Tyne, on the 31 Instant, in the Name of William Hope, a Bill of Exchange, for 541 l. 8 s. which was taken out of that Mail, with a forged Endorsement thereon.

The said William Lownds or Lowins, otherwise called Hope, is about Thirty-five Years of Age, Five Feet Eight or Nine Inches high, stout made, dark Complexion, has remarkably good black Hair, which he wears tied behind; he has the Appearance of a Seafaring Man, and is supposed to have been born at Congleton in Cheshire, has been in Ireland lately, and has a little of that Dialect: He has lived at Sunderland, and was married there about Ten Years ago, but has not lived with his Wife for some Years.

He was again married at Alfreton in Derbyshire, in 1785, to Amy Clark, by whom he has two

Children, and has resided at Hexham in Northumberland since the 8th of March last. He left that Place the 4th Instant with his Wife and Family, whom he left at Darlington, and after transacting some Business at the Two Banks there, he came to London in the Mail Coach, and arrived on Monday Morning the 7th Instant, and immediately went to Mess. Smith, Wright and Gray, Bankers, where he negotiated a Bill of Exchange, and wrote the Name "W. Lownds" thereon.

He is supposed to have in his Possession a Promissory Note of one of the Banks at Newcastle, dated 3d June, 1790, for One Hundred Pounds, payable on Demand to Mr. William Hope, or Order.

Whoever shall apprehend and convict, or cause to be apprehended and convicted, the said William Lownds or Lowins, otherwise called Hope, of the said Robbery of the Mail, will be entitled to a Reward of TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, over and above the Reward given by Act of Parliament for apprehending of Highwaymen; or if any Person, whether an Accomplice in the said Robbery, or knowing thereof, shall make Discovery whereby the said William Lownds or Lowins, otherwise called Hope, may be apprehended and brought to Justice, such Discoverer will, upon Conviction of the Party, be entitled to the same Reward of TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, and will also receive His Majesty's most gracious Pardon.
