AT the Court at St. James's, the 27th of August, 1790,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS an Act of Parliament was passed in the Twenty-ninth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Second, intituled, "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Salt Petre, and to enforce the Law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms and Ammunition; and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying Coastwise of Salt Petre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition;" whereby it is declared and enacted, that His Majesty may, by Proclamation or Order in Council, prohibit the exporting or the attempting to export Salt Petre out of this Kingdom, in such Manner and under such Restraints as He shall think fit; His Majesty judging it necessary for the present to prohibit the Exportation of Salt Petre out of this Kingdom, excepting to the Kingdom of Ireland, doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, that no Person or Persons do, at any Time until further Order, transport out of this Kingdom, nor attempt to transport, nor be aiding or assisting in transporting any Salt Petre, excepting to the Kingdom of Ireland, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring or suffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by the aforementioned Act: And His Majesty doth hereby further order, that upon the Exportation of any Salt Petre to the Kingdom of Ire-

land, the Exporter shall enter into a Bond, with Two sufficient Sureties to His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors, in double the Value of the Salt Petre so to be exported, for the landing of such Salt Petre in some Port in Ireland, which shall be expressed in such Bond; and that upon producing a Certificate under the Hands and Seals of the Collector, Comptroller, or other principal Officer of the Customs at the Port where such Salt Petre shall be landed, testifying the landing thereof, such Bond so entered into as aforesaid shall be delivered up; and that the Condition of such Bond shall be, to produce such Certificate as aforesaid in Six Months from the Date thereof, (the Danger of Seas and Enemies excepted;) and in case no such Certificate shall be produced within Six Months as aforesaid, that the Commissioners of the Customs shall cause such Bonds respectively to be put in Suit, unless they shall find sufficient Cause to forbear the same. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Proclamations of the 7th Day of May last for granting Bounties for the encouraging of Seamen and Landmen to enter themselves on Board His Majesty's Ships of War, and Rewards for discovering Seamen who may secrete themselves, was, by His Majesty's Order in Council of the 23d

of June last, prolonged and extended to the 31st of this instant August: And whereas by another Order in Council, bearing Date the 4th of this present Month of August, His Majesty was pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to declare that the said Bounties and Rewards should thenceforth cease and determine, and be no longer paid, and payable in this Kingdom, to such Able or Ordinary Seamen, or to such Able-bodied Landmen as should enter themselves in the Kingdom of Ireland to serve in His Majesty's Navy, or to such Persons who might discover any Seaman or Seamen who should secrete him or themselves in that Kingdom, from and after the Date of the said Order: And whereas it is expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the Bounties granted to Able and Ordinary Seamen and Able-bodied Landmen entering themselves in the Kingdom of Great Britain, and the Rewards to Persons discovering Seamen who secrete themselves in this Kingdom, should continue to be paid for some Time longer: His Majesty doth therefore, by the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, That the Time limited for the Payment of such Bounties and Rewards be prolonged and extended from the said 31st of this instant August to the 31st Day of October next inclusive: Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

Whitehall, August 17.

AS several Artificers and Manufacturers, Subjects of Great Britain, have from Time to Time gone into Foreign Countries to exercise their several Callings, contrary to the Laws of these Kingdoms; the following Abstracts of Acts of Parliament of their late Majesties, King George the First and Second, and of His present Majesty, for preventing such Practices, are published for the Information of all Persons who may be ignorant of the Penalties they may incur by Disobedience to them.—And it will be observed, that such Penalties likewise extend to those who are any ways concerned or instrumental in the Sending or Enticing Artificers or Manufacturers out of these Kingdoms, or in the Exportation of the Tools and Instruments used by them, as well as to the Artificers or Manufacturers themselves.

Statute 5 George I. Chap. 27.

IF any Person shall contract with, entice, or solicit, any Artificer in Wool, Iron, Steel, Brasses, or other Metal, Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer of Great Britain, to go into Foreign Countries, out of the King's Dominions, and shall be convicted thereof upon Indictment or Information, in any of the Courts at Westminster, or at the Assizes or Quarter-Sessions, he shall be fined any Sum not exceeding ONE HUNDRED POUNDS for the first Offence, and shall be imprisoned Three Months, and till the Fine be paid. And if any Person having been once convicted, shall offend again, he shall be fined at the Discretion of the Court, and imprisoned Twelve Months, and till the Fine be paid.

If any of the King's Subjects, being such Artificers, shall go into any Country out of His Ma-

jesty's Dominions, to exercise or teach the said Trades to Foreigners; and if any of the King's Subjects in any such Foreign Country, exercising any of the said Trades, shall not return into this Realm within Six Months after Warning given by the Ambassador, Minister or Consul of Great Britain, in the Country where such Artificers shall be, or by any Person authorised by such Ambassador, &c. or by one of the Secretaries of State, and from henceforth inhabit within this Realm; such Persons shall be incapable of taking any Legacy, or of being an Executor or Administrator, or of taking any Lands, &c. within this Kingdom, by Descent, Devise or Purchase; and shall forfeit all Lands, Goods, &c. within this Kingdom, to His Majesty's Use, and shall be deemed Alien, and out of His Majesty's Protection.

Upon Complaint made upon Oath before any Justice of Peace that any Person is endeavouring to seduce any such Artificer, or that any such Artificer hath contracted, or is preparing to go out of His Majesty's Dominions, for the Purposes aforesaid; such Justice may send his Warrant to bring the Person complained of before him, or before some other Justice; and if it shall appear by the Oath of one Witness, or by Confession, that he was guilty of any of the said Offences, such Justice may bind him to appear at the next Assizes or Quarter Sessions: And if such Person shall refuse to give Security, the Justice may commit him to Goal till the next Assizes or Quarter Sessions, and until he shall be delivered by due Course of Law. And if any such Artificer shall be convicted upon Indictment of any such Promise, Contract, or Preparation to go beyond the Seas for the Purpose aforesaid, he shall give such Security to the King, not to depart out of His Majesty's Dominions, as such Court shall think reasonable, and shall be imprisoned till Security given.

If any of the above Offences shall be committed in Scotland, the same shall be prosecuted in the Court of Justiciary, or the Circuits there.

Statute 23 George II. Chap. 13.

IF any Person shall contract with, or endeavour to seduce any Artificer in Wool, Mohair, Cotton or Silk, or in Iron, Steel, Brasses, or other Metal, or any Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer in any other of the Manufactures of Great Britain or Ireland, to go out of this Kingdom or Ireland, into any Foreign Country, not within the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, and shall be convicted upon Indictment or Information in the King's Bench at Westminster, or by Indictment at the Assizes or General Gaol Delivery for the County, &c. wherein such Offence shall be committed in England, or by Indictment in the Court of Justiciary, or any of the Circuit Courts in Scotland, or by Indictment or Information in the King's Bench at Dublin, if such Offence be committed in Ireland; the Person so convicted shall, for every Artificer contracted with, or seduced, forfeit FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprisonment in the Common Goal of the County or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted, for Twelve Calendar Months, and until Forfeiture be

be paid: And in Case of a subsequent Offence of the same Kind, the Persons so again offending shall forfeit, for every Person contracted with or seduced, ONE THOUSAND POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprisonment in the Common Gaol of the County or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted, for Two Years, and until such Forfeiture be paid.

If any Person in Great Britain or Ireland shall put on Board any Ship or Boat not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, any such Tools or Utensils as are commonly used in or proper for the Preparing, Working up or Finishing of the Woollen or Silk Manufactures or any Part of such Tools, he shall for every Offence forfeit all such Tools, or Parts thereof, put on Board, and TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered by Action of Debt, &c. in any Court of Record at Westminster, or in the Court of Session in Scotland, or at any of the Four Courts in Dublin respectively, wherein no Essoin, &c. shall be allowed.

It shall be lawful for any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain, or for any Officer of the Revenue in Ireland, to seize and secure, in some of His Majesty's Warehouses, all such Tools or Utensils prohibited to be exported, as such Officer shall find on Board any Vessel not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain; and all Tools so seized shall, after Condemnation, be publicly sold to the best Bidder; and one Moiety of the Produce shall be to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Officer who shall seize and secure the same.

If the Captain of any Vessel in Great Britain or Ireland knowingly permit any of the said Tools, prohibited to be exported, to be put on Board his Vessel, he shall for every such Offence forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as the Penalties inflicted upon Persons exporting the Tools; and if the Vessel belongs to His Majesty, the Captain shall not only forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, but shall also forfeit his Employment, and be incapable of any Employment under His Majesty.

If any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain, or of the Revenue in Ireland, take, or knowingly suffer to be taken, any Entry outward, or sign any Cocket or Sufferance for the Shipping or Exporting of any of the said Tools, or knowingly suffer the same to be done, he shall forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as aforesaid, and also forfeit his Office, and be incapable of any Office under His Majesty.

One Moiety of the Forfeitures shall be applied to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Use of the Person who shall sue for the same.

Statutes 14, 21, 25 and 26 of His present Majesty.

BY these Statutes the like Penalties and Forfeitures as above mentioned are extended to Persons packing or putting on board any Vessel, not bound directly for some Port in Great Britain

or Ireland, any Machine, Engine, Tool, Press, Paper, Utensil or Implement whatsoever used in, or proper for the working or finishing of the Cotton, Linen, Steel or Iron Manufactures of this Kingdom, or any Part or Parts of such Machines or Implements, or any Models or Plans thereof;— and all Captains of Ships and other Persons receiving or being in Possession of any such Articles, with an Intent to export the same to Foreign Parts, and all Custom-house Officers suffering an Entry to be made thereof, are respectively liable to the like Penalties as are above mentioned, in the Case of Tools and Utensils used in the Woollen and Silk Manufactures.

Breslaw, August 15.

The King of Prussia arrived here on the 11th Instant, after having visited several of his Fortresses and Military Positions in the County of Glatz. Immediately upon His Majesty's Arrival a Levee was held; and, at the same Time, a Promotion of General Officers took Place.

Hague, August 24.

This Day Prince William Frederic, Hereditary Prince of Orange and of Nassau, having completed the 18th Year of his Age, was received to a Seat in the Council of State, upon the Proposition made by the Province of Holland to the States General. His Serene Highness was introduced to the States General by the Greffier, and to the Council of State by the Grand Pensionary; and all other Ceremonies took Place similar to what were observed in 1738.

His Serene Highness was also promoted to the Rank of General in the Armies of the Republic, on the Proposition of the Prince Stadthouder, pursuant to a Resolution of the States General, formally communicated to the Stadthouder by the Grand Pensionary and the Baron Lynden de Blytterswick; by which Resolution their High Mightinesses also offered the extraordinary Appointments annexed to the Rank of General.

The Hereditary Prince afterwards received compliments of Felicitation at the Stadthouder's Apartments in the Palace of the Hague, where his Serene Highness had a crowded Levee; at which also were present the several Members of the Corps Diplomatique, and many Foreigners of Distinction.
