ON Tuesday Night last the Body of his late Royal Highness, Prince Henry Frederick Duke of Cumberland and Strathern, was privately interred in the Royal Vault in King Henry the Seventh's Chapel at Westminster, having been conveyed to the Prince's Chamber the Night before.

About Nine o'Clock the Procession began to move, passing through the Old Palace Yard, to the South-East Door of Westminster Abbey, upon a Floor railed in, covered with Black Cloth, under an Awning, and lined on each Side with a Party of the Foot Guards, in the following Order :

sounding a solemn March; the Coverings of the Drums and the Banners of the Trumpets adorned with Naval Trophies.

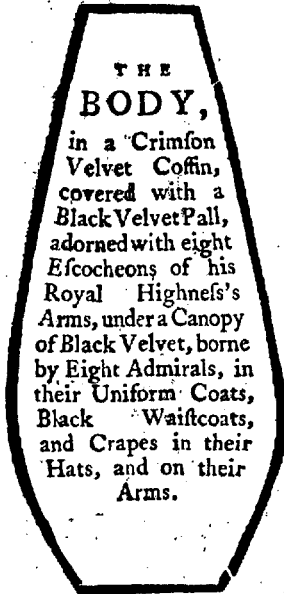

N. B. Peers, Peers Sons, and Privy Councillors, were likewise called over, and some attended.

At the Entrance of Westminster Abbey, within the Church, the Dean and Prebendaries, attended by the Choir, received the Body, falling into the Procession just before the Officer of Arms who conducted the Lord Chamberlain, and so proceeded into King Henry the Seventh's Chapel, where the Body was deposited on Treffels, the Head towards the Altar, the Coronet and Cushion being laid upon the Coffin, and the Canopy held over it, while the Service was read by the Dean of Westminster; the Chief Mourner and his Two Supporters sitting on Chairs at the Head of the Corpse, the Lords Assistants and Supporters of the Pall on Stools on either Side.

The Part of the Service before the Interment being read, the Corpse was deposited in the Vault; and the Dean having finished the Burial Service, Garter proclaimed his Royal Highness's Stile as follows:

Thus it hath pleased Almighty God to take out of this transitory Life unto His Divine Mercy, the late Most High, Most Mighty and Illustrious Prince HENRY FREDERICK, Duke of Cumberland and Strathern, Earl of Dublin, Knight of the Most Noble Order of the Garter, fourth Son of the late Most Illustrious Prince FREDERICK, Prince of Wales, deceased, and third Brother to His Most Excellent Majesty GEORGE the Third, by the Grace of God King of Great Britain, France and Ireland, Defender of the Faith; whom God bless and preserve with long Life, Health and Honour, and all Worldly Happiness.

The King of Sweden has fixed his Residence, for the Remainder of the Season, at Drottningholm, where the brilliant Amusements of the Place have resumed their usual Course. His Swedish Majesty is attended by a numerous Court, and the whole Royal Family (except the Duke of Ostrogothia) is now assembled there, the Duke of Sudermania having arrived from Finland the Day before Yesterday, on-board the Camilla Frigate.

Vienna, September 15.

Their Hungarian and Sicilian Majesties, together with the Archdukes and Princesses, arrived here last Night in good Health.

Copenhagen, September 18.

On Tuesday last their Royal Highnesses the Prince and Princess Royal made their Public Entry into this Capital. The Procession was extremely magnificent, and consisted of the King, the Queen Dowager, and all the different Branches of the Royal Family, together with the principal Officers of their respective Households. Their Royal Highnesses were received with the most universal Demonstrations of Joy. Various Entertainments were given at the Palace, and the Town was illuminated Three Nights successively. The Counts Schinamelman and Scheel, and Admiral Kaas were created Knights of the Order of the Elephant. The Order of Dannebrog was conferred on the Counts Frederick, Reventlau, and Baudissin; the Generals Wegner, Goltz, Bülar, Castenchiöld and Wachnitz, and on Mess. Buchvalt, Urné, Seckendorff, Moltke, and Wächter. And several other Gentlemen were promoted to the Ranks of Privy Councillors, Councilors of State, Councillors of Conference, and Chamberlains.
