AT the Court at St. James's, the 6th of October, 1790,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by virtue of an Act, passed in the last Session of Parliament, intituled, "An Act to continue the Laws now in Force for regulating the Trade between the Subjects of His Majesty's Dominions and the Inhabitants of the Territories belonging to the United States of America, so far as the same relate to the Trade and Commerce carried on between this Kingdom and the Inhabitants of the Countries belonging to the said United States," His Majesty, by the Advice of His Privy Council, did, by an Order in Council made on the 1st Day of April, 1790, amongst other Things, declare, That any unmanufactured Goods and Merchandizes, the Importation of which into this Kingdom is not prohibited by Law, (except Fish-Oil, Blubber, Whale-Fins and Spermaceti) and any Pig-Iron, Bar-Iron, Pitch, Tar, Turpentine, Rosin, Pot-Ash, Pearl-Ash, Indigo, Masts, Yards and Bowsprits, being the Growth or Production of any of the Territories of the United States of America, and no other Goods or Merchandizes, might (until further Order) be imported directly from thence into any of the Ports of this Kingdom, either in British-built Ships, owned by His Majesty's Subjects and navigated according to Law, or in Ships built in the Countries belonging to the United States of America, or any of them, and owned by the Subjects of the said United States, or any of them, and whereof the Master and Three-fourths of the Mariners at least are Subjects of the said United States, or any of them, and may be entered and landed in any Port

of this Kingdom, upon Payment of the same Duties as the like Sorts of Goods or Merchandize are or might be subject and liable to if imported in British-built Ships, owned by His Majesty's Subjects and navigated according to Law, from any British Island or Plantation in America; notwithstanding such Goods or Merchandize, or the Ships in which the same may be brought, might not be accompanied with the Certificates or other Documents heretofore required by Law.

And whereas Doubts have arisen upon the true Intent and Meaning of that Part of His Majesty's Order in Council herein before mentioned which respects the Importation of Fish-Oil, Blubber, Whale-Fins and Spermaceti, and such other Goods and Merchandize, being of the Growth, Production or Manufacture of the said United States, as are not therein enumerated or described; His Majesty, by the Advice of His Council, doth hereby order and declare, That Oil made from Fish or Creatures living in the Sea, and Blubber, Whale-Fins and Spermaceti, and also all other Goods and Merchandize, the Importation of which into this Kingdom is not prohibited by Law, being the Growth, Production or Manufacture of any of the Territories of the said United States of America, and not enumerated or described in the said Order, may be imported from thence into this Kingdom in British or American Ships, owned and navigated as by the said Order is required, upon Payment of such Duties of Customs and Excise as are payable on the like Goods or Merchandize upon their Importation into this Kingdom from Countries not under the Dominion of His Majesty, according to the Tables, marked A. D. and F. annexed to an Act, passed in the Twenty-seventh Year of His present Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act for re-

“ paying the several Duties of Customs and Excise, and granting other Duties in Lieu thereof, and for applying the said Duties, together with the other Duties composing the Publick Revenue; for permitting the Importation of certain Goods, Wares and Merchandize, the Produce or Manufacture of the European Dominions of the French King, into this Kingdom; and for applying certain unclaimed Monies remaining in the Exchequer for the Payment of Annuities on Lives to the Reduction of the National Debt;” or by any other Laws in Force, passed subsequent to the said Act, for that Purpose; and in Cases where different Duties are therein imposed upon the like Goods imported from different Countries not under the Dominion of His Majesty, then upon the Payment of the lowest of such Duties; and such Goods and Merchandize shall be entitled to the same Drawbacks as are allowed upon the Exportation of the like Goods and Merchandize from this Kingdom, according to the before-mentioned Tables, or by any other Laws in Force, passed subsequent to the said Act, for that Purpose; and shall be liable to the same Rules, Regulations and Restrictions as the like Goods and Merchandize are liable to upon Importation into any Port of this Kingdom, by any Laws in Force for that Purpose.

And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Proclamation of the 7th Day of May last, for granting Bounties for the encouraging of Seamen and Landmen to enter themselves on Board His Majesty's Ships of War, was, so far as respects the Bounties granted to Able and Ordinary Seamen, and Able-bodied Landmen, entering themselves in the Kingdom of Great Britain, and the Rewards to Persons discovering Seamen who might secrete themselves in this Kingdom, prolonged and extended, by His Majesty's Order in Council of the 27th of August last, until the 31st Day of this instant October: And whereas it is expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the said Bounties and Rewards should continue to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, by the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, That the Payment of such Bounties to Able and Ordinary Seamen entering themselves in the Kingdom of Great Britain, to serve in His Majesty's Fleet, and also the Reward to Persons discovering Seamen who secrete themselves in this Kingdom, be continued to the 31st Day of December next inclusive:—Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

The King has also been pleased to grant to the Right Honorable William Hall Gage, Viscount Gage of the Kingdom of Ireland and Baron Gage of Fille in the Kingdom of Great Britain, the Dignity of a Baron of the said Kingdom of Great Britain, by the Name, Style and Title of Baron Gage, of Highmeadow in the County of Gloucester, with Remainder to his Nephew Henry Gage, Esq; and the Heirs Male of his Body lawfully begotten.

The King has also been pleased to grant to William Newham, of Scarborough in the County of York, Gentleman, His Royal Licence and Authority to assume and use the Surname of Lacy only, in pursuance of the Will of William Lacy, late of Scarborough aforesaid, Gentleman, deceased; and also to order that this His Majesty's Concession and Declaration be registered in His College of Arms.

Naples, October 5.

Yesterday being the Name-Day of the Hereditary Prince of the Two Sicilies, and an Extraordinary Courier having arrived the Day before with the News of his Royal Highness's Marriage with the Arch-Duchess Maria Clementina having been celebrated by Proxy at Vienna, there was, by Order of his Sicilian Majesty, a Grand Gala and a general Illumination in this City.

The Eruption in Mount Vesuvius still continues, but it's Violence is somewhat abated. As the several Lavas which have taken their Course down the Flanks of the Volcano, for Three Weeks past, have proceeded from it's Crater, they have seldom been able to reach the Vineyards, and have as yet done but little Damage. The Ashes have fallen in great Abundance, even at Naples, and must considerably affect the Vintage of this Year. After the dreadful Eruptions of 1767 and 1779, the present is the most formidable that has happened.
