

“ paying the several Duties of Customs and Excise, and granting other Duties in Lieu thereof, and for applying the said Duties, together with the other Duties composing the Publick Revenue; for permitting the Importation of certain Goods, Wares and Merchandize, the Produce or Manufacture of the European Dominions of the French King, into this Kingdom; and for applying certain unclaimed Monies remaining in the Exchequer for the Payment of Annuities on Lives to the Reduction of the National Debt;” or by any other Laws in Force, passed subsequent to the said Act, for that Purpose; and in Cases where different Duties are therein imposed upon the like Goods imported from different Countries not under the Dominion of His Majesty, then upon the Payment of the lowest of such Duties; and such Goods and Merchandize shall be entitled to the same Drawbacks as are allowed upon the Exportation of the like Goods and Merchandize from this Kingdom, according to the before-mentioned Tables, or by any other Laws in Force, passed subsequent to the said Act, for that Purpose; and shall be liable to the same Rules, Regulations and Restrictions as the like Goods and Merchandize are liable to upon Importation into any Port of this Kingdom, by any Laws in Force for that Purpose.

And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Proclamation of the 7th Day of May last, for granting Bounties for the encouraging of Seamen and Landmen to enter themselves on Board His Majesty's Ships of War, was, so far as respects the Bounties granted to Able and Ordinary Seamen, and Able-bodied Landmen, entering themselves in the Kingdom of Great Britain, and the Rewards to Persons discovering Seamen who might secrete themselves in this Kingdom, prolonged and extended, by His Majesty's Order in Council of the 27th of August last, until the 31st Day of this instant October: And whereas it is expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the said Bounties and Rewards should continue to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, by the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, That the Payment of such Bounties to Able and Ordinary Seamen entering themselves in the Kingdom of Great Britain, to serve in His Majesty's Fleet, and also the Reward to Persons discovering Seamen who secrete themselves in this Kingdom, be continued to the 31st Day of December next inclusive:—Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

The King has been pleased to grant the Dignities of Viscount and Earl of the Kingdom of Great Britain to the Right Honorable Henry Baron Digby,

and the Heirs Male of his Body lawfully begotten, by the Name, Style and Title of Viscount Colehill in the County of Warwick, and Earl of Digby in the County of Lincoln.

The King has also been pleased to grant the Dignity of an Earl of the Kingdom of Great Britain to the Right Honorable Algernon Percy Lord Lovaine, Baron of Alnwick, and the Heirs Male of his Body lawfully begotten, by the Name, Style and Title of Earl of Beverley in the County of York.

The King has also been pleased to grant to the Right Honorable William Hall Gage, Viscount Gage of the Kingdom of Ireland and Baron Gage of Fife in the Kingdom of Great Britain, the Dignity of a Baron of the said Kingdom of Great Britain, by the Name, Style and Title of Baron Gage, of Highmeadow in the County of Gloucester, with Remainder to his Nephew Henry Gage, Esq; and the Heirs Male of his Body lawfully begotten.

The King has also been pleased to grant to William Newham, of Scarborough in the County of York, Gentleman, His Royal Licence and Authority to assume and use the Surname of Lacy only, in pursuance of the Will of William Lacy, late of Scarborough aforesaid, Gentleman, deceased; and also to order that this His Majesty's Concession and Declaration be registered in His College of Arms.
