Yesterday came fresh Letters from Nimiguen. The Minister of the King of Denmark refiding here, has advice, that Babus has capitulated the 27 paft, and was then delivered up to the Sieur Guldenlieu; and the Letters from Hamburg and those parts, bad us expect to hear of an engagement between the two Armies in Schonen, which it feems are very near together, not far from Christianstads,

Paris, Aug. 6.
